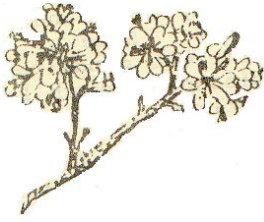

Dear Friends,

I have been with and among you now six months, five months as deacon and now one month as priest. Time flies when you're having fun! Each new day, I come to appreciate more and more the many different ways that 'Outward and Visible Signs' work in our liturgy, around our communal life, and for our mission and ministry to the world.

Having found 'keys to the kingdom' for the church sign on Seminary Road, I hope you notice changes made to the message(s) posted. I want you to begin to anticipate (and even suggest) what new word the 'former Signing Deacon, now Posting Priest' puts up. Certainly, noting service time changes is important to keeping our neighborhood and any potential visitors aware of when we assemble for worship. Is it 8:00 and 10:00 a.m.? Or 8:00, 9:15 and 11:15 a.m.? Whoa! Where did **2:00 p.m.** come from? (Answer: The Bishop's recent annual episcopal visit. I hope you didn't miss it. It was so special!)

For me, it is important that our message to the world 'out there' is that we are alive and kicking! People know that when the annual Pumpkin Patch fills our front lawn with a sea of orange each October. The wider community can see it when we bless God's creatures, great and small, out in front of our chapel. The City of Alexandria and commuters who pass by see Immanuel at worship when Mass on the Grass is out front and loud and proud. There may be other occasions I have not yet witnessed, but all these tell the world we are grateful for our many blessings. It demonstrates our call to prayer and praise of God and to do works which help usher in the Kingdom of God in this place at this time.

All of these are sacramental in their own way, for they are "outward and visible signs of an inward and spiritual grace" which permeates who we are and what we do. We are a living, breathing, active community of disciples who regularly tries to answer the call from Mark 16:15 to "Go into all the world and proclaim the Good News."

Chrissie and I continue to join in the ebb and flow of Immanuel Church-on-the-Hill. So we rely on the parish calendar to be aware of regular, on-going or specific, one-time offerings, which occur in our physical plant, on our grounds, and around the rectory. However, not all activities, either here or over at VTS in the 1823 Pub, are accounted for on our parish calendar. Why is that? Some groups are very good about advertising their meetings and/or activities. Others, not so much.

Some may think the church calendar is only for building use management, but I suggest to you it also represents us to the outside world, the community in which we live, the whole width, breadth, height and depth of ministries and talents of God's people here at ICOH. Sharing that information proclaims to the world beyond Immanuel (via our new and improved website) and is also evident to those within our community (as items are listed in the calendar and noted in Sunday service bulletins) what's happening. They are outward and visible signs! Let's show and share who we are, and whose we are!

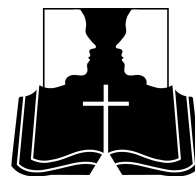
Here's what you can bring to share with all, arranged by surname:

Sara Fein

I have been a member of ICOH since fall of 1999. I worked with the Godly Play program for one year, but most of my involvement in the church has been in the area of pastoral care. I was trained as a Eucharistic minister by our seminarian, Paul Price, in 2003 and joined the pastoral care committee at that time because Eucharistic ministers belong to that committee. I became chair of the committee in fall of 2006 and continue in that position. I also schedule the Eucharistic Visitors (as they are called now) and wrote the handbook used in training Eucharistic Visitors after the initial training by Paul Price. I am a member of the worship committee and have served as chalice bearer and as reader. In addition, I am a member of the mediation group, the Circle of Quiet, and I regularly take a turn in leading that group. Last year, I finished the 4-year EFM (Education for Ministry) class taught here by Sudie McGahuey.

I am ready to become more involved at ICOH now because I retired in October 2012 and have the time and energy to focus on important areas of my life that I had to be more energy-reserved about while I was working. I was a senior social scientist at the Food and Drug Administration, and in that position, I conducted policy analysis, served as project director for contracted work, and led various teams of inter-agency and interdisciplinary scientists to write policies, regulations, and professional papers. The trajectory of scientific development in the West has made this question a central point of disagreement in the debates about science and religion. **The Rev. Kyle Matthew Oliver** will share some models for how we might, in ways informed by science, talk about God's action in the world. The Rev. Oliver serves as the Digital Missioner and Learning Lab Coordinator in the Center for the Ministry of Teaching at Virginia Theological Seminary and Assistant for Pastoral Care at St. Paul's Parish in Washington. Before seminary, Kyle worked in the Computational Nuclear Engineering Research Group at the University of Wisconsin.

What will our bodies be like in heaven?

As Christians we believe that we will have "life everlasting," not just as spiritual beings, but also that our bodies will be resurrected to new life, as well. **Dr. Sonderegger**, Professor of Theology at Virginia Theological Seminary and author of *That Jesus Christ was Born a Jew: Karl Barth's "Doctrine of Israel,"* will talk about the various theories of how this could be possible, to share what our post-resurrection bodies might be like.
