#### A BIDDING PRAYER

Beloved in Christ, in this season of Advent, let it be our care and delight to prepare ourselves to hear again the message of the Angels, and in heart and mind to go even unto Bethlehem, to see the Babe lying in a manger.

These prayers and praises let us humbly offer up to the throne of heaven. The Almighty God bless us with his grace; Christ give us the joys of everlasting life; and unto the fellowship of the citizens above may the King of Angels bring us all. *Amen*.

#### A New Heaven and a New Earth

Then I saw a new heaven and a new earth; for the first heaven and the first earth had passed away, and the sea was no more. ## Annunciation, Magnificat

In the sixth month the angel Gabriel was sent by God to a town in Galilee called Nazareth, to a virgin engaged to a man whose name was Joseph, of the house of David. The virgin's name was Mary. And he came to her and said, "Greetings, favored one! The Lord is with you." But she was much perplexed by his words and pondered what sort of greeting this might be. The angel said to her, "Do not be afraid, Mary, for you have found favor with God. And now, you will conceive in your womb and bear a son, and you will name him Jesus. He will be great, and will be called the Son of the Most High, and the Lord God will give to him the throne of his ancestor David. He will reign over the house of Jacob forever, and of his kingdom there will be no end." Mary said to the angel, "How can this be, since I am a virgin?" The angel said to her, "The Holy Spirit will come upon you, and the power of the Most High will overshadow you; therefore the child to be born will be holy; he will be called Son of God. the fruit of your womb. And why has this happened to me, that the mother of my Lord comes to me? For as soon as I heard the sound of your greeting, the child in my womb leaped for joy. And blessed is she who believed that there would be a fulfillment of what was spoken to her by the Lord."

And Mary said, "My soul magnifies the Lord, and my spirit rejoices in God my Savior, for he has looked with favor on the lowliness of his servant. Surely, from now on all generations will call me blessed; for the Mighty One has done great things for me, and holy is his name. His mercy is for those who fear him from generation to generation. He has shown strength with his arm; he has scattered the proud in the thoughts of their hearts. He has brought down the powerful from their thrones, and lifted up the lowly; he has filled the hungry with good things, and sent the rich away empty. He has helped his servant Israel, in remembrance of his mercy, according to the promise he made to our ancestors, to Abraham and to his descendants forever."

## A Brief History of Lessons and Carols

The Festival of Lessons and Carols as we know it dates to December 1918, at King's College, Cambridge, in the days immediately following the end of World War I. The Rev. Eric Milner-White, Dean of the College, reflected on his experiences as a British army chaplain and developed this liturgy as an opportunity to remember God's great promises, even in the midst of so much suffering and untold devastation. The lessons speak of God's great plan of salvation, articulated by Israel's prophets and poets, and realized in the birth of Jesus Christ.

There are Advent and Christmas versions of the liturgy throughout the Anglican Communion, as this service has become a deeply beloved tradition for millions worldwide. The readings for this service in particular were chosen to highlight God's promise of remaking and redeeming all things. Beginning with Christ, God has promised to make all things new.

## GAUDETE SUNDAY

Gaudete Sunday, the third Sunday of Advent, takes its name from the Latin word *Gaudete*, which means "rejoice." It is the first word in the proper Introit for the third Sunday of Advent, from the Roman missal. It is often symbolized by a pink or rose color, hence the traditional pink candle in Advent wreaths.

The readings for this day are characterized by joy and expectancy, as we look towards the celebration of Our Lord's Nativity.



## CHRISTMAS FAMILIES SPECIAL COLLECTION TODAY, December 11th

For forty years a strong and faithful commitment of bringing the good news of Christmas in a very tangible form that manifests God's inclusive love for all and raises hope has been woven into the fabric of Immanuel. Christmas Families has evolved into a multi-pronged program of several activities all serving one purpose: To bring Christ's transformative and comforting presence into the world, letting God's people know that somebody cares through giving toys and science kits and books to learn and grow with.

First, parishioners sign up to provide toys for a family in need. The families are referred to us by the Alexandria Department of Community and Human Services and by the New Hope Housing organization that resettles families after a shelter stay, for a total of 79 families with 210 children and 90 parents. 32 parish families, 2 families from the Beverly Hills neighborhood responding to Dorothy Kellogg's posting on their email listsery, and the Valley Drive Cooperative Preschool signed up for 41 families (94 children, 40 parents), leaving 116 children and 50 parents. And we are still expecting about 10 referrals from the Lazarus Refugee Ministry administered by Christ Church (Melanie Gray) for Region IV. (When all other lists are closed, we are still spreading God's love.) The Christmas Families team, acting for the whole parish, buys gifts for the families who are not "adopted", to be wrapped and sorted in the Parish Hall this morning and afternoon.

But there is much more. Books are so important. Connie Kurz, Laura Snow, and crew assigned books to all the families referred to us, about 600 books in all. In addition, a selection of books goes to the Community Lodgings after-school programs. And we give to each of the 140 children in the CFNC (Child and Family Network Centers) free preschools one copy of Anno's Counting Book and one of 500 Words / 500 Palabras (small format paperback, for each word a picture and text in English and Spanish).

In our long-standing collaboration with the Lazarus Refugee Ministry we provided 240 fleece blankets for children to cuddle with. (Christ Church raised over \$30,000 to provide substantial gift cards to Target and Giant for each family).

In a joint effort of Christmas Families and our expanded social justice and criminal justice ministry, we support the Offender Aid and Restoration (OAR, https://www.oaronline.org/) with their Project Winter Cheer for gift cards to children of incarcerated people, with \$1,500.

We cannot do all of this on a dime. **Please be generous TODAY!** Checks can be made out to Immanuel, marked "XFAM", in the collection plate or sent to the office.

The Christmas Families team makes each dollar go far. Linda got the fleece blankets for just under \$10, regular \$26.99. These purchases earned \$500 in Kohl's cash for more baby and other toys. Every year, Connie and Laura make a 3-hour trip to the Green Valley Book Fair to buy good books at a steep discount. Anno's Counting Book and 500 Words are staples in our book ministry. Every three years or so we buy 500 copies of each, the minimum to get a 50% discount from the publisher. Whenever we find an exceptional bargain, we buy enough for two or three years. Laura Snow, Candy Levin, and Brooke Roberts make beautiful outfits for purchased dolls. Others restore used bicycles. Linda worked with the VéloCity Bike Cooperative who provided 27 restored bicycles. So many people contribute their talents to spreading God's love.
