Annunciation, Magnificat



CHANGE IN COMMUNION PRACTICE RELATED TO INTINCTION: Our Bishop has issued a new policy discouraging communicants who wish to intinct (dip) the consecrated Bread from doing the intincting themselves. The goal is to avoid the many fingers and fingernails that can find their way into the Wine of the chalice, and the new procedure will resemble in some ways what we did during the later stages of the pandemic. The procedure is as follows:

Receive the consecrated Bread as usual.

If you plan to drink from the chalice please consume the Bread, as usual, and then move to the chalice to drink.

If you plan to intinct, please leave the Bread in your hand, and the Chalicist will intinct for you and then place the intincted Bread back on your hand (or on your tongue, for those who prefer).

Prayers for healing, with the laying on of hands, are offered at the icon on the right side of the Altar during Communion.

GAUDETE SUNDAY

Gaudete Sunday, the third Sunday of Advent, takes its name from the Latin word *Gaudete*, which means "rejoice." It is the first word in the proper Introit for the third Sunday of Advent, from the Roman missal.

It is often symbolized by a pink or rose color, hence the traditional pink candle in Advent wreaths.

The readings for this day are characterized by joy and expectancy, as we look towards the celebration of Our Lord's Nativity.



A Brief History of Lessons and Carols

The Festival of Lessons and Carols as we know it dates to December 1918, at King's College, Cambridge, in the days immediately following the end of World War I. The Rev. Eric Milner-White, Dean of the College, reflected on his experiences as a British army chaplain and developed this liturgy as an opportunity to remember God's great promises, even in the midst of so much suffering and untold devastation. The lessons speak of God's great plan of salvation, articulated by Israel's prophets and poets, and realized in the birth of Jesus Christ.



The readings for this service in particular were chosen to highlight God's promise of remaking and redeeming all things. Beginning with Christ, God has promised to make all things new.



Ingathering and blessings of the gifts, the great celebration. This will be a very special day in our life as a parish. We will praise God and lift our own spirits as we lift our voices in the glorious singing in *Lessons and Carols.* The blessing of the gifts with which we bring the good news of Christmas into the world is an integral part of this service, showing the unity of in-reach and outreach as inseparable parts of faith. At the forum hour we will show the same spirit in the wrapping of the gifts for children who were not "adopted", always an event of both great purpose in outreach and of great fellowship. See you all there.

We still have 123 children and 58 parents to provide for. These gifts will be wrapped and sorted at the forum hour. This year in addition to the main gift each child will receive a stocking stuffer so they have two things to open. For example, a child indicating interest in arts and science will receive a nice art kit and paper and a small science toy (bought at half price, \$6). A kit to make a friendship bracelet is another stocking stuffer. ((Kudos to Linda Serabian for this wonderful idea.) With more children than last year, and two gifts to wrap for each, wrapping and sorting will be a massive task. We start at 9 in the parish hall and go on until finished with an intermission from 10:15 to noon for Lessons and Carols.

Last Saturday, December 9th, Connie Kurz and Laura Snow lead a work party **assigning 800 books**, **two to three books for each child.** The stacks of books will be wrapped and joined with the other gifts for a family.

Many used things for the boutique already came in. Remember to bring any used **toys and children's books, calendars you receive in the mail, and gently used clothing and blankets** this Sunday. The boutique's set up is scheduled for tomorrow, December 18th, starting at 9 a.m. at the Department of Community and Human Services, 4850 Mark Center Dr., Alexandria, VA 22311.

The Christmas Families Team buys gifts and books at a great discount. So while every dollar spent goes far, it still takes a lot of money to get gifts for 123 children, a small gift for 58 parents, and books for everyone.

The purpose of the **special collection** is to make buying all of things possible. **Please contribute generously**.

Our former Rector the late Reverend Bill Dols once told me "Christmas Families is a ministry of things". But Christmas Families is so much more. It is about things that speak. Things that speak of God's all-embracing love, of joy, of learning, of spirits rekindled, of "a *new heavens and a new earth*" (Isaiah 65:17), of the coming of God's Kingdom into the here and now.
