The First Lesson: 1 Kings 19:9-18

At Horeb, the mount of God, Elijah came to a cave, and spent the night there. Then the word of the Lord came to him, saying, "What are you doing here, Elijah?" He answered, "I have been very zealous for the Lord, the God of hosts; for the Israelites have forsaken your covenant, thrown down your altars, and killed your prophets with the sword. I alone am left, and they are seeking my life, to take it away."

He said, "Go out and stand on the mountain before the Lord, for the Lord is about to pass by." Now there was a great wind, so strong that it was splitting mountains and breaking rocks in pieces before the Lord, but the Lord was not in the wind; and after the wind an earthquake, but the Lord was not in the earthquake; and after the earthquake a fire, but the Lord was not in the fire; and after the fire a sound of sheer silence. When Elijah heard it, he wrapped his face in his mantle and went out and stood at the entrance of the cave. Then there came a voice to him that said, "What are you doing here, Elijah?" He answered, "I have been very zealous for the Lord, the God of hosts; for the Israelites have forsaken your covenant, thrown down your altars, and

killed your prophets with the sword. I alone am left, and they are seeking my life, to take it away." Then the Lord said to him, "Go, return on your way to the wilderness of Damascus; when you arrive, you shall anoint Hazael as king over Aram. Also you shall anoint Jehu son of Nimshi as king over Israel; and you shall anoint Elisha son of Shaphat of Abel-meholah as prophet in your place. Whoever escapes from the sword of Hazael, Jehu shall kill; and whoever escapes from the sword of Jehu, Elisha shall kill. Yet I will leave seven thousand in Israel, all the knees that have not bowed to Baal, and every mouth that has not kissed him."

The Epistle: Romans 10:5-15

Moses writes concerning the righteousness that comes from the law, that "the person who does these things will live by them." But the righteousness that comes from faith says, "Do not say in your heart, 'Who will ascend into heaven?" (that is, to bring Christ down) "or 'Who will descend into the abyss?"" (that is, to bring Christ up from the dead). But what does it say?

"The word is near you, on your lips and in your heart" (that is, the word of faith that we proclaim); because if you confess with your lips that Jesus is Lord and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved. For one believes with the heart and so is justified, and one confesses with the mouth and so is saved. The scripture says, "No one who believes in him will be put to shame." For there is no distinction between Jew and Greek; the same Lord is Lord of all and is generous to all who call on him. For, "Everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved."

But how are they to call on one in whom they have not believed? And how are they to believe in one of whom they have never heard? And how are they to hear without someone to proclaim him? And how are they to proclaim him unless they are sent? As it is written, "How beautiful are the feet of those who bring good news!"

The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ, according to Matthew Response: *Glory to you, Lord Christ*.





Creation Care Tip: Watering Right in Extreme Heat

This summer, our planet has experienced unprecedented heat waves all across the globe. As creation stewards, how can we keep our gardens surviving during these droughts? Are there sustainable watering practices? Turns out, there are. In a recent Washington Post article, Lauren David said best practices include watering around the base of plants (not all over the foliage); watering deeply and without excessive water pressure; watering early in the morning for optimal water absorption; watering with efficient tools such as hand-held nozzles or soaker hoses (ideally, not sprinklers); and adding more mulch around plants to protect the soil from overheating and drying out. There are also important steps to avoid when watering during extreme heat, according to sustainability news source Treehugger. With these helpful watering hints, may your garden grow resilient and thrive!

The Rev. Randy Alexander and a handful of parishioners – with widely varied experiences, perspectives, and policy concerns – have been listening to each other regarding these related issues this spring and summer. Mass shootings, less newsworthy but more prevalent violent crime, including gun-related violence, as well as more local issues of violence, and the related issues of mental illness and loneliness, have been on our minds and hearts.

We don't have an "agenda" for a parish conversation, just a sense - as Christian believers - that God calls us out of doing nothing to explore what we as followers of Jesus are called to do in the face of crisis, pain and evil. We don't know what to do, what the role of a church is in the face of this kind of protracted crisis, but we do know that we are to listen when we hear the Lord tugging at our hearts. And we also know that within our parish, perspectives on these issues vary widely, so that as a first step it makes sense to listen to each other and discern

what we can learn, as a Christian community called to love and peace, from each other as we try to face, rather than ignore, these complex and difficult issues.



UPCOMING SENIOR ADULT MINISTRY AND FELLOWSHIP EVENTS

<u>August 22nd, 12:15 p.m. - Brown Bag Lunch, Zabriskie Parish Hall</u>: In 2017 the Washington National Cathedral removed two stained glass windows that honored Robert E. Lee and Stonewall Jackson and began a process of discerning what should replace those windows. In 2021, Kerry James Marshall was commissioned to design, created and install two new racial-justice themed windows and Dr. Elizabeth Alexander agreed to write a poem to be inscribed alongside the windows. The new windows and poem will be unveiled and dedicated on September 23 and Senior Adult Ministry and Fellowship will be taking a van into Washington to see the new windows in the coming months. Meanwhile, join us in the Parish Hall on Tuesday, August 22, at 12:15 to get a bit of history behind the decision to remove and replace windows in the Cathedral and to hear Cathedral Dean Randy Hollerith and Mr. Marshall talk about this project that has been years in the making.

Luncheon will begin at 12:15pm in the parish hall and our program will start around 12:30. Don't forget to bring your own sandwich or salad and Senior Ministry will provide beverages and dessert. There is no cost for this event and no reservation is required.
