From now on, we regard no one from a human point of view; even though we once knew Christ from a human point of view, we know him no longer in that way. If anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new! All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ, and has given us the ministry of reconciliation; that is, in Christ God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting the message of reconciliation to us. So we are ambassadors for Christ, since God is making his appeal through us; we entreat you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God. For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God.

The Holy Gospel: Luke 15:1-3, 11b-32

The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ, according to Luke Response: *Glory to you*, *Lord Christ*.

All the tax collectors and sinners were coming near to listen to Jesus. And the Pharisees and the scribes were grumbling and saying, "This fellow welcomes sinners and eats with them."

So Jesus told them this parable:

"There was a man who had two sons. The younger of them said to his father, 'Father, give me the share of the property that will belong to me.' So he divided his property between them. A few days later the younger son gathered all he had and traveled to a distant country, and there he squandered his property in dissolute living. When he had spent everything, a severe famine took

place throughout that country, and he began to be in need. So he went and hired himself out to one of the citizens of that country, who sent him to his fields to feed the pigs. He would gladly have filled himself with the pods that the pigs were eating; and no one gave him anything. But when he came to himself he said, 'How many of my father's hired hands have bread enough and to spare, but here I am dying of hunger! I will get up and go to my father, and I will say to him, "Father, I have sinned against heaven and before you; I am no longer worthy to be called your son; treat me like one of your hired hands." So he set off and went to his father. But while he was still far off, his father saw him and was filled with compassion; he ran and put his arms around him and kissed him. Then the son said to him, 'Father, I have sinned against heaven and before you; I am no longer worthy to be called your son.' But the father said to his slaves, 'Quickly, bring out a robe--the best one--and put it on him; put a ring on his finger and sandals on his feet. And get the fatted calf and kill it, and let us eat and celebrate; for this son of mine was dead and is alive again; he was lost and is found!' And they began to celebrate.

"Now his elder son was in the field; and when he came and approached the house, he heard music and dancing. He called one of the slaves and asked what was going on. He replied, 'Your brother has come, and your father has killed the fatted calf, because he has got him back safe and sound.' Then he became angry and refused to go in. His father came out and began to plead with him. But he answered his father, 'Listen! For all these years I have been working like a slave for you, and I have never disobeyed your command; yet you have never given me even a young goat so that I might celebrate with my friends. But when this son of yours came back, who has devoured your property with prostitutes, you killed the fatted calf for him!' Then the father said to him, 'Son, you are always with me, and all that is mine is yours. But we had to celebrate and rejoice, because this brother of yours was dead and has come to life; he was lost and has been found."'

The Nicene Creed

We believe in one God. the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself, and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all.

TOUR WOODLAWN MANSION AND POPE-LEIGHEY HOUSE

Senior Ministry and Fellowship will be going to tour Woodlawn Mansion and Pope-Leighey House on Thursday, April 21. Woodlawn, originally part of Mt. Vernon, was the home of George Washington's nephew and his wife. It was operated by the Lewises as a plantation with over 90 enslaved people. It was later sold to Quaker timber merchants who maintained it as an agricultural cooperative of Free Black and Quaker landowners. It has been in the National Trust for Historic Preservation since 1949. Pope-Leighey House was designed by Frank Lloyd Wright. Commissioned in 1939, it was donated to the National Trust in the mid-1960s when it was moved to make way for expansion of I-66.

There will be a van leaving the Zabriskie parking lot at 12:30pm. Each house takes one hour to tour, with a maximum of 10 people per tour. Our tours start at 1:00pm and after an hour we will switch over to the other house. We will plan to arrive back at Zabriskie no later than 4:00pm.

SOLAR PROJECT INSTALLATION: Immanuel is finally going solar! Tomorrow, Monday, March 28 Sustainable Energy Systems will begin the installation of solar arrays on the roof of the Zabriskie Campus. The installation will take 2-3 weeks with final inspections completed on/about April 20th — barring any weather related delays. The final project milestone will occur perhaps as early as mid-May when Dominion Power replaces our electrical meter and the system begins generating electricity. Our analysis shows the arrays will generate approximately 60-65% of our electrical needs on an annual basis.
