Therefore I want you to understand that no one speaking by the Spirit of God ever says "Let Jesus be cursed!" and no one can say "Jesus is Lord" except by the Holy Spirit.

Now there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit; and there are varieties of services, but the same Lord; and there are varieties of activities, but it is the same God who activates all of them in everyone. To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good. To one is given through the Spirit the utterance of wisdom, and to another the utterance of knowledge according to the same Spirit, to another faith by the same Spirit, to another gifts of healing by the one Spirit, to another the working of miracles, to another prophecy, to another the discernment of spirits, to another various kinds of tongues, to another the interpretation of tongues. All these are activated by one and the same Spirit, who allots to each one individually just as the Spirit chooses.

The Holy Gospel: John 2:1-11

The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ, according to John Response: *Glory to you, Lord Christ*.

On the third day there was a wedding in Cana of Galilee, and the mother of Jesus was there. Jesus and his disciples had also been invited to the wedding. When the wine gave out, the mother of Jesus said to him, "They have no wine." And Jesus said to her, "Woman, what concern is that to you and to me? My hour has not yet come." His mother said to the servants, "Do whatever he tells you." Now standing there were six stone water jars for the Jewish rites of purification, each holding twenty or thirty gallons. Jesus said to them, "Fill the jars with water." And they filled them up to the brim. He said to them, "Now draw some out, and take it to the chief steward." So they took it. When the steward tasted the water that had become wine, and did not know where it came from (though the servants who had drawn the water knew), the steward called the bridegroom and said to him, "Everyone serves the good wine first, and then the inferior wine after the guests have become drunk. But you have kept the good wine until now." Jesus did this, the first of his signs, in Cana of Galilee, and revealed his glory; and his disciples believed in him.







Here at Immanuel, we have been striving to help senior adults (those of us who are 60 years and older) forge and maintain strong connections with others in the parish. With this goal in mind, we have social luncheons together, entertain speakers in Zabriskie Parish Hall, and undertake trips together to various local attractions. The focus of events varies; some are focused on things in the Episcopal tradition (a visit to the Washington National Cathedral or lunch with a speaker from the Episcopal Public Policy Network) whilst others are enjoyment of the arts (Glenstone Museum trip or lunch with the director of the Washington Metropolitan Philharmonic), gardens (Hillwood Estate), history (the Museum of the US Army). And some are just plain fun, like a picnic on the Anacostia River with a pontoon boat cruise or a wine tasting and apple buying tour. We aim for things that are accessible and inclusive, and form memories together.

In the year before the pandemic, over 100 people participated in the offerings of Senior Adult Ministry/ Fellowship, and since restarting our activities in mid-2021, over 70 people have attended trips and/or lunches. It would be great if we could reach more interested senior adults with offerings that are appealing and advertise our offerings in the way that reaches the most people with clear information on what we'll be doing and when it will happen.


