The First Lesson: Genesis 15:1-12,17-18

SOLAR PROJECT INSTALLATION: Sustainable Energy Solutions (SES) advised us in January that the building permit package for Immanuel's solar array installation is complete and has been submitted to the City of Alexandria for review and permitting. On February 28, SES let us know the City expects to complete the review March 11, 2022 and issue the permit needed soon after. SES still needs to receive delivery of some key components (an inverter and optimizers), essential to have before installation can begin. Installation should take 10-14 days barring any weather delays. The good news is the solar panels are in storage locally and, thanks to the generosity of our parishioners, we have more than sufficient funds to cover the next progress payment to SES. Assuming receipt of Alexandria City permit and all needed components, SES now hopes for a late March/early April 2022 installation of our solar system.
