Merciful God, who sent your messengers the prophets to preach repentance and prepare the way for our salvation: Give us grace to heed their warnings and forsake our sins, that we may greet with joy the coming of Jesus Christ our Redeemer; who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.



CHANGE IN COMMUNION PRACTICE RELATED TO INTINCTION: Our Bishop has issued a new policy discouraging communicants who wish to intinct (dip) the consecrated Bread from doing the intincting themselves. The goal is to avoid the many fingers and fingernails that can find their way into the Wine of the chalice, and the new procedure will resemble in some ways what we did during the later stages of the pandemic. Starting *today*, the procedure will be:

Receive the consecrated Bread as usual.

If you plan to drink from the chalice please consume the Bread, as usual, and then move to the chalice to drink.

If you plan to intinct, please leave the Bread in your hand, and the Chalicist will intinct for you and then place the intincted Bread back on your hand (or on your tongue, for those who prefer).

Celebrant: The Gifts of God, for the People of God.

We will receive at one standing station. If you are physically unable to come to the Altar, please let an usher know that you would like to have Communion brought to you.



Family History: Living the Civil Rights Era, with Bryant Mitchell

Ask The General Assembly to LIMIT SOLITARY CONFINEMENT in Virginia

Jesus calls on us to care for those in prison. For a number of years, we have been doing just that through Outreach support to groups like Offender Aid and Restoration, Samaritan Ministry, and the Virginia Interfaith Center for Public Policy. Last year, the Social Justice Committee consulted extensively with the Alexandria Sheriff, the Commonwealth's Attorney, a public defender and Immanuel's Outreach partners to see what more decisive action we could take on this issue. Based on that consultation, the Vestry encouraged us to engage with Virginia's legislature to prohibit solitary confinement for more than two weeks, something the national Episcopal Church and many other denominations have formally condemned as a form of torture. Over the course of 2023, we joined with the Interfaith Center and many houses of worship throughout the State, and our efforts produced two of the most bipartisan pieces of legislation to emerge from the General Assembly this year. The legislation didn't put a time limit on solitary confinement, but the first bill created several procedural safeguards, and the second bill funded an Ombudsman's office to oversee the Department of Corrections' compliance with those safeguards.

We are going to Richmond again on January 17 to get the office of the Ombudsman formally authorized, and to see what other improvements we might be able to make on this issue.
