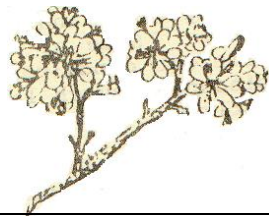

Dear Friends,

As I hope most have now heard, your Vestry called Immanuel's tenth Rector in late May. The Reverend J. Randolph Alexander comes to us from Christ Church, Pelham N.Y., a diverse and growing parish in Westchester County, where he has served as Rector since 2000. His first Sunday with us is August 25th.

Some of you may have met Randy last spring when he was one of six candidates for Bishop Suffragan of the Diocese of Virginia. And we have posted a short profile of Randy and his family, his C.V. and his "Philosophy & Vision of Parish Ministry" at icoh.net for you to read and share with others.

We announced the good news to the parish on Pentecost Sunday, a joyous day of swirling doves, soaring song, voices speaking in many tongues — and birthday cake. Once again we celebrated the birth of the Church, but we also celebrated the end of an 11-month search lead by Wendy John and her diligent committee: Caroline Bergmark, Tom Brown, Governor Burke, Jim Clausen, Carry Cuddy, Barbara Curry, Tom Harris, Doug Henry, Chandley McDonald, Eileen Monnin-Kirby and Martha Sedgwick.

Since our "Rector Wanted" sign was posted in November, the members reviewed 32 candidates, conducted 10 interviews via Skype, invited four candidates to visit. Finally, small groups visited two candidates at their home parishes. Informed by your "wish list," discerned over the summer through parish interviews and surveys, the committee sought:

- ** *an inspired preacher*
- ** *a proven leader*
- ** *a champion of lay ministry*
- ** *an advocate of Outreach ministries*
- ** *a personable provider of pastoral care*
- ** *a wise and caring spiritual leader*

At each round of decision making, the committee found Randy Alexander's name bubbling to the top. He embodies all these gifts in spades. Now our church is poised for new birth under a talented new Rector, and we plan to welcome Randy, his wife Patty and sons William, Peter and Andrew in our trademark warm and welcoming Immanuel style. ***And all of you can help:***

Christmas Families in August: Dominican Republic, Haiti, Alexandria

Help children with school supplies – critical tools for learning!

Every fall children in the Dominican Republic, Haiti, and Alexandria go off to school without the critical tools for learning. They do not have backpacks, notebooks, crayons, pencils, scissors, calculators, or the money for gym uniforms and fees. Maybe not having school supplies doesn't seem like such a terrible hardship. But take a moment to think back to your own childhood. Remember how excited you were to pick out your supplies, making sure to get just the right color of notebook, Now picture the hurt on a child's face when he or she learns their family can't afford to buy all the school materials they need. These children need our help.

There are three ways you can help

1) Alexandria Child Protective Services identified families in need (many of them are families we helped last Christmas). You can sign up to provide school supplies for the children in one family any time between Sunday, June 9, through Sunday, August 4, on the sign-up boards in the narthex of Zabriskie Chapel. Several Immanuel families may want to sign up together to help one large family, and that is okay! Please put your name and phone number with the family you choose, and take from the manila folder the corresponding sheet with the names and a list of items suggested for each grade level. Please bring the school supplies to church on or before Sunday, August 18. (For students for whom Mt Vernon or Tucker Elementary School is noted, the deadline is Sunday, July 21, because they start on August 1.)

2) You can donate money at the special collections during Immanuel's services on July 21 and August 18 (or by mail or delivery to the church office anytime between now and August 18). Please make checks out to Immanuel Church-on-the-Hill and mark them XFAM. The money will be allocated as follows:

One third to Episcopal schools in the Dominican Republic

One third to Episcopal schools in Haiti

One third to Alexandria (1/6 to Child Protective Services and 1/6 to Community Lodgings)

3) You can donate additional school supplies – especially backpacks (new or used and in good shape). Please look for the box in the narthex of Zabriskie Chapel to deposit your donations.

Let us give all children a good start in the new school year!

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Pumpkin Patch – 2013!! To many in Alexandria and Arlington, Immanuel is simply known as the “Pumpkin Church” -- and for good reason. Now in its 20th year, the Pumpkin Patch

in many ways epitomizes who we are and what we do. For a month, we all pitch in as a Christian community in a common endeavor. The results speak for themselves. Last year, we had a profit of \$56,772 all going to outreach. Since the year 2000, your efforts have raised over *half a million dollars*. The effects of that money are far-reaching. Because of your efforts at the Pumpkin Patch:

- children in Mirebalais, Haiti, have access to clean water in a region where cholera is endemic.
- a priest in Guerra, Dominican Republic, is better able to see and communicate with his parishioners.
- homeless shelters in Alexandria serve wholesome nutritious meals.
- victims of AIDS and their families get vital services and support.
- homeless street persons in our region get vital counseling, health and job services.
- The list goes on and on.

All this doesn't just happen. The Pumpkin Patch requires the efforts of the entire parish in organizing, advertisement, baking, and selling. Though it may seem far off, we are organizing now for October, when we will have four truck deliveries: two on October 6th, and one each on October 16th and 23rd.

We need *everyone* to help sell pumpkins. However, right now we *need managers and coordinators* for the various tasks. The attached list shows the current staff organization and numerous vacancies. Several jobs need to be filled immediately.

Pumpkin Team Shepherd: This person networks with all managers. We need somebody with organizational skills who has had prior experience at the Patch. The Shepherd's job is not to do the various tasks, but to assure that those tasks are properly identified and assigned to the right managers and coordinators. It is *not* (necessarily) a multi-year commitment.

Food Manager: Food sales are 100% profit for the church, and contributed to 35% of last year's total profits. The Food Manager and three coordinators will organize among dozens of parishioners the making of soups, apple crisps, and baked goods. The objective is to provide a steady stream of foods to sell, particularly on weekends.

Volunteer Manager and Sign-Up Coordinator: The patch has to be staffed from 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. every day from October 6th through Halloween. The Volunteer Manager and the Sign-Up Coordinator will arrange for parishioners to fill time slots for each day.

Daily Coordinators: These persons assist the Volunteer Manager and Operations Manager for a particular day of the week to assure the patch is properly opened, closed and staffed.

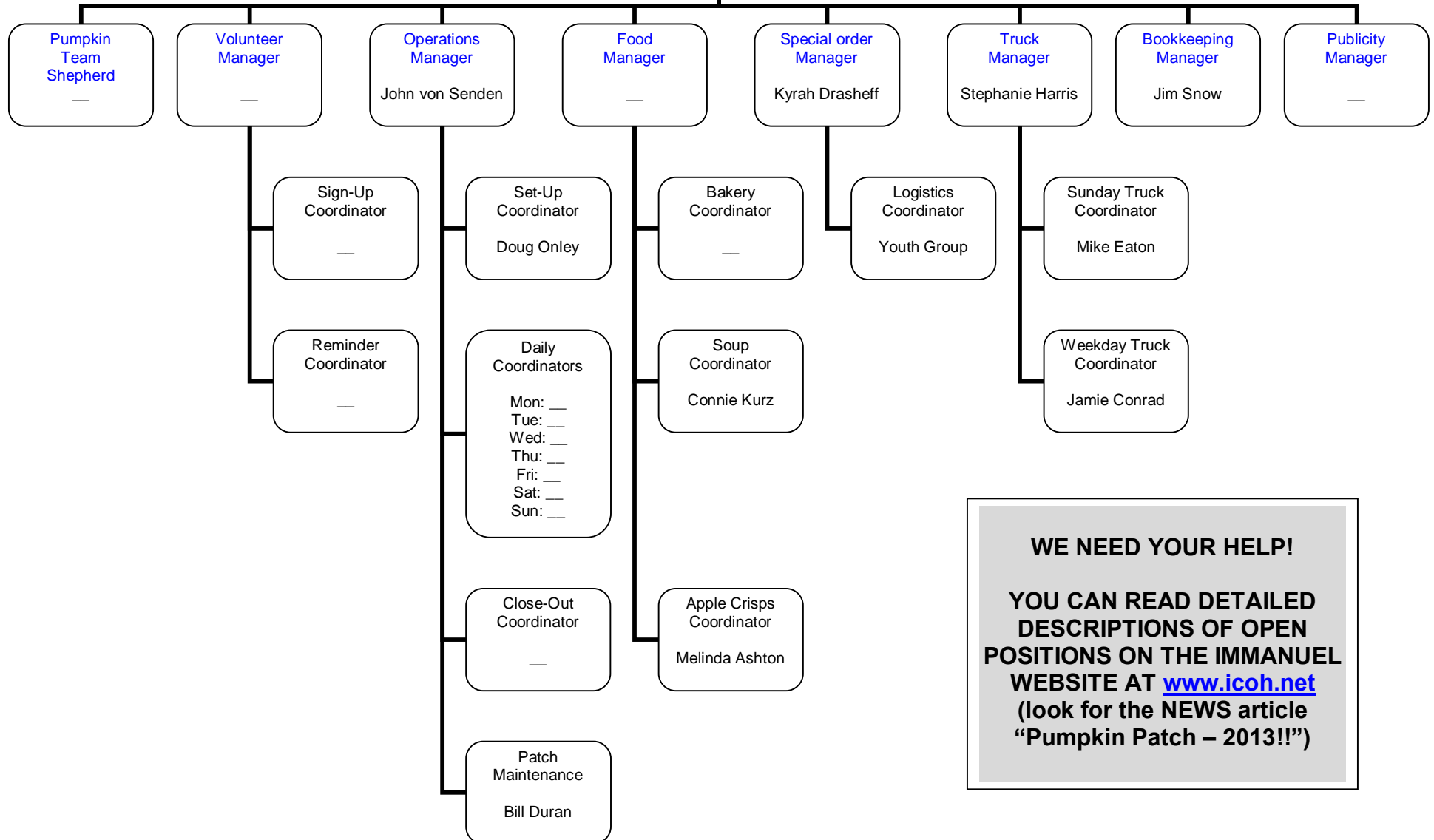
Publicity Manager: Publicity involves contacting local press, radio and TV outlets, as well as the writing and distribution of flyers in the community.
