BISHOP'S VISITATION: This Sunday, January 15th, the Rt. Rev. Shannon Johnston, Bishop of Virginia, will be with us at the 10:30 Eucharist in Immanuel Chapel to preach, celebrate, and receive members of the parish into the Episcopal Church. **He will also lead a forum**, beginning at 9:15 in the Parish Hall at Zabriskie Chapel, including time for questions and answers about the life of the Diocese. There will be a festive reception in the Welcome Center following the 10:30 Eucharist. Please come to share in this time with our Bishop, and to celebrate this important occasion in the ongoing celebration of our 75th anniversary.

VESTRY ELECTIONS & ANNUAL MEETING, JANUARY 22, 2017

Vestry candidates were asked to respond to the following three questions:

- 1. Summarize your church activities and some of the qualities you would bring to Vestry service.
- 2. Describe something that you find very valuable or that you love about Immanuel.
- 3. Describe how you would view the ministry of the Vestry as part of your Christian journey.



KAREN BESSER: 1. Since coming home to Immanuel 40 years ago, I have taught Sunday school and led jr/sr high youth groups, represented Immanuel on the board of Carpenter's Lodging, and participated in worship planning and EFM. But my longest commitment to our corporate life has been 38 years singing with the choir.

I bring a long view of the life of this parish and familiarity with its rhythms, and experience with various aspects of our ministry.

2. So many things to love about Immanuel. It is wonderful to me that so many Immanuel families include adults who grew up in the parish. I value our terrific preaching and lovely music. And I love the impact of joy and hope the parish brings to our community via the pumpkin patch and

Christmas families.

3. My last vestry term was during staff turnover at Immanuel which brought challenges to the parish. And yet we saw the advent of the pumpkin patch! A parish life has its ups and downs, and accepting and embracing that as gift and opportunity is a significant aspect of my Christian journey.



JIM CLAUSEN 1. Since officially joining Immanuel in 1991, I have taught Sunday School (preschool) and been Sunday School Coordinator; served on the Vestry as Junior Warden (2000-2002); led one Lay Committee workgroup and participated on another; served on our latest Rector Search Committee; and have sung in the choir (joyfully, if not skillfully) since about the mid-'90s. I've also participated in many of the fall Bicycles-For-Christmas charity workshops, and every pumpkin unloading since the start of that great program. As a retired Naval Officer and current Federal Civil Servant, I can bring

organizational ability, strategic planning skills, conflict resolution experience and energy to the Vestry. I am deeply committed to this parish, and have a vested interest in its long term success. My wife and I were married at Immanuel in 1982, and 3 of our 4 children were baptized here...it is my spiritual (and in many ways) my social home.

Our congregation is, obviously, the most valuable part of our Church; and I love spending time here. I feel uplifted and empowered with every engagement. Our Rector and our Director of Music bring us closer to God, with beauty and grace, at every service...and I know we are very lucky to have such competent, caring professionals in our midst. I am also very grateful for the efforts of our loving and capable volunteer parishioner Sunday School teachers and our Director of Children, Youth, and Family Ministries. Our youth is our future and that future looks bright!

As much as I gain from my association with this parish, taking a turn "in the driver's seat" from time to time is a welcome responsibility and small payment for the many benefits I, and my family, accrue. Vestry service will deepen my relationship with the Rector and his staff, and with parishioners with whom I do not regularly connect. In this sense, it is very much an outreach mission with existing parishioners and, very importantly, with potential new congregants. I expect that Vestry duty will "turbocharge" the evangelical spirit within me to enable spiritual satisfaction of current parishioners, continued growth of the congregation as a whole, and always needed personal growth.
