If anyone else has reason to be confident in the flesh, I have more: circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless.

Yet whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard as loss because of Christ. More than that, I regard everything as loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, in order that I may gain Christ and be found in him, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the law, but one that comes through faith in Christ, the righteousness from God based on faith. I want to know Christ and the power of his resurrection and the sharing of his sufferings by becoming like him in his death, if somehow I may attain the resurrection from the dead.

Not that I have already obtained this or have already reached the goal; but I press on to make it my own, because Christ Jesus has made me his own. Beloved, I do not consider that I have made it my own; but this one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, I press on toward the goal for the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus.

GOOD FRIDAY/EASTER APPEAL FOR THE DIOCESE OF JERUSALEM

This Lenten season, please consider continuing the now 100-year Lenten tradition of the American Episcopal Church's support to Anglican and Episcopal churches in the Diocese of Jerusalem through contributing to the American Friends of the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem (AFEDJ).

AFEDJ contributions support Diocese of Jerusalem outreach and charitable efforts in Gaza, the West Bank, Israel, Lebanon, and Jordan, through a network of schools, hospitals, and rehabilitation centers serving largely poor and needy people regardless of faith, with this year's appeal particularly supporting St. Luke's hospital in Nablus, the only charitable hospital in that major city.

Immanuel has a longstanding relationship with the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem, including many Immanuel pilgrims who have worshipped with Palestinian Episcopalians in the Holy Land as well as hosting former Immanuel Seminarian and VTS alum The Rev. Halim Shukair and parishioner Hossam Naoum (ordained last year as Archbishop of the Diocese of Jerusalem).
