The First Lesson: Acts 2:1-21 *In observance of Pentecost, parishioners will read in many languages.*

When the day of Pentecost had come, the disciples were all together in one place. Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya belonging to Cyrene, and visitors from Rome, both Jews and proselytes, Cretans and Arabs-- in our own languages we hear them speaking about God's deeds of power." All were amazed and perplexed, saying to one another, "What does this mean?" But others sneered and said, "They are filled with new wine."

But Peter, standing with the eleven, raised his voice and addressed them, "Men of Judea and all who live in Jerusalem, let this be known to you, and listen to what I say. Indeed, these are not drunk, as you suppose, for it is only nine o'clock in the morning. No, this is what was spoken through the prophet Joel: 'In the last days it will be, God declares, that I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh, and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, and your young men shall see visions, and your old men shall dream dreams. Even upon my slaves, both men and women, in those days I will pour out my Spirit; and they shall prophesy. And I will show portents in the heaven above and signs on the earth below, blood, and fire, and smoky mist. The sun shall be turned to darkness and the moon to blood, before the coming of the Lord's great and glorious day. Then everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved.' "





UPDATE ON THE EPISCOPAL DIOCESE OF JERUSALEM IN LIGHT OF VIOLENCE IN GAZA AND

ISRAEL: As Stand with Iraqi Christians noted last week in their presentations in the DC area, being a Christian in the Middle East is increasingly challenging, and support from US partners is both important and encouraging. With violence expanding in Gaza over the past few weeks, the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem has provided updates to its supporting parishes about the situation there, with an interview with the faithful head of Al Ahli hospital in Gaza, a hospital that does not shut its doors to anyone under any circumstances, despite the dangers and challenges. Former Immanuel parishioner Most Rev. Hosam Naoum, now Archbishop of Jerusalem, recently said, "Throughout this emergency, the dedicated staff of our Ahli Hospital in Gaza, at great personal risk, have been working around the clock, tending to the wounded and accepting urgent surgical cases that other overburdened hospitals have been unable to take. This flood of patients has taxed their limited resources, leading to shortages of medicines, medical supplies, and fuel for their generators that must run for extended hours due to electrical black-outs." While we did not publicize the annual Good Friday appeal of the American Friends of the Diocese of Jerusalem this year because of their appeal for help to earthquake victims in Syria during Lent, you can provide support to the Diocese's ministry of healing in Gaza by visiting https://afedj.org/give/give-online/.

Primary Elections coming up in Virginia

Primary elections for Virginia Delegates and Senators have begun! Primary Election Day is June 20, but you may vote in some districts now. Primary elections are held only in districts where there are within-party challenges for the nomination to run in the November election; in the rest of the districts candidates for nomination are unopposed or are chosen by conventions. There will be no primaries in Alexandria this year, but there will be in Arlington and part of Fairfax County.

Do you know which Virginia delegate and senate district you live in? *Not so fast!* All district boundaries have been re-drawn in the last year, and yours may have changed. To find out for sure which districts you live in, go to https://whosmy.virginiageneralassembly.gov/ and enter your address.

Additional info for Arlington and Fairfax residents:

For those of us who live in Arlington or Fairfax counties, there are primaries for Democratic candidates for certain offices in the November elections. Primaries are all open in Virginia. This means that you may vote in this year's primary without being a Democrat and your voice will be heard.

Remember – if you have changed addresses or even apartments in the same building, you must change your voter registration. Even if you haven't moved, your polling place may have. So check on the web sites. Arlington County is trying out Ranked Choice Voting in the primary for the Arlington County Board. Republicans used this process in the 2021 primaries. There is a lot of information on the Arlington election website concerning how this type of voting, in which you are able to vote for your first, second, and third choice, is tabulated. Information also includes a great example using favorite ice cream flavors.
