





UPDATE ON AL AHLI HOSPITAL Run by the Diocese of Jerusalem in northern Gaza



A recent joint letter from Archbishop of Jerusalem, Hosam Nouam (a former worshiper at Immanuel) and Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby, states, "As war devastates the Holy Land, we ask where Christ is to be found amid the cries of His children. When the lives of the innocent are at risk, we strain our eyes for the light of the One who offers healing, peace, and justice. In Gaza, the Al Ahli hospital, run by the Diocese of Jerusalem, is that light."

We at Immanuel have supported the Diocese, worshiped in its churches and befriended its Palestinian priests and parishioners, visited its hospitals, and provided support to Al Ahli Hospital over many years. As we keep in

our prayers both the Israelis killed, wounded, and taken hostage a few weeks ago, and the large and growing numbers of Palestinians in Gaza, killed, wounded, displaced and in need, Al Ahli hospital and staff have continued to provide care. This is in spite of two separate explosions, one on October 14 that significantly damaged parts of the hospital and injured four staff, and the more widely reported October 17 explosion in the hospital parking lot, injuring between 100 and 500 people seeking refuge there. (Thankfully, no hospital patients nor staff were among the dead.)

Despite widespread and contradictory reporting, the cause of that damage remains unclear. Please continue to <u>lift up all involved</u> in this conflict, including leaders for wisdom and compassion. Archbishop Nouam asks us: "And so, my sisters and brothers in Christ, I appeal to you first of all to pray for our mission here, as well for the peace of Jerusalem (Psalm 122:6). Secondly, advocate with your representatives for a just and lasting peace in the Holy Land, so that all who dwell within these lands can live in security. Finally, if you are able, support our ministries in Gaza, Palestine, and Israel, and throughout the Diocese of Jerusalem."

Christmas Families has evolved into a multi-pronged program of several activities all serving one purpose: To bring Christ's transformative and comforting presence into the world, letting God's people know that somebody cares through giving toys and science kits and books to learn and grow with and blankets to keep warm.

Christmas Families 2022 Report and Christmas Families Finances

Christmas Families in August

We provided backpacks filled with school supplies for all 70 children on our list. Thanks to the generous contributions to the special collections of approx. \$4,000 we could send checks earmarked for school supplies:

Haiti Micah Project \$2,000 to help them provide an oasis to children in a dysfunctional state

Community Lodgings \$1,000 and Human Services \$1,000 (Alexandria total \$2,000)

Christmas Families in Christmas times. This is what we provided:

Gifts for 84 families (98 parents, 223 children, 321 people in all) referred by Alexandria Human Services (73), New Hope Housing (6), and the Lazarus Refugee Ministry administered by Christ Church for Region IV (5). Half of the families where "adopted" by 32 parishioners, 2 Beverly Hills neighborhood families responding to Dorothy Kellogg's listsery post, and the Valley Drive Cooperative Preschool. The other half was provided for by the special collection and many parishioners efforts to buy, assign, and wrap gifts.

Books: 600 to the 84 families, 50 to the **Community Lodgings** after-school program, and to the 150 children in the **CFNC** free preschools: *Anno's Counting Book* and 500 Words / 500 Palabras (for each word a picture).

37 bicycles: 33 beautifully refurbished by the Vélocity Bicycle Cooperative, Alexandria who graciously agreed to work with us and 4 from a parishioner.

Through the Lazarus Refugee Ministry we provided 240 fleece blankets for children to cuddle with.

In a joint effort with our expanded social & criminal justice ministry, we gave \$1,500 to the Offender Aid and Restoration (OAR, www.oaronline.org/) for gift cards to children of incarcerated people.

Below is a broad summary of expenses and income. We had to draw on the Christmas Families Fund, which is intended as a cushion and not to cover major current expenses. We will need to adapt the size of the program to the amount of annual income. This may reflect that in the post-pandemic world parish membership has declined.
