RECTOR'S REPORT

"Now there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit; and there are varieties of services, but the same Lord; and there are varieties of activities, but it is the same God who activates all of them in everyone. To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good" (1 Corinthians 12:4-7).



Dear Brothers and Sisters of Immanuel:

The above quote is from St. Paul's beautiful comparison of the Body of Christ, the people of God gathered in worship, service, and community, to the human body. It's an image Paul's early readers could readily appreciate; a human body requires many different parts performing unique functions but always working together for the good of the whole. So it is with the Body of Christ, the Church.

The Rev. Carol Anderson, former Rector of All Saints' Church, Beverly Hills, CA., used to say that "the parish Church is the hope of the world." I am unfailingly inspired when I remember her quote. It is one of those benchmark, reference quotes for me, one of those which has meaning in each new season. So, as I write this report, I have to ask how has Immanuel been a place where God's hopes for the world has been lived out in 2023? How have we, as individual members with different gifts, abilities, and interests, worked together for the good of the whole? Well, it's a mixture of things that can be quantified and those that cannot.

On the quantifiable side, we offered many liturgies to the glory of God and for the upbuilding of God's people. We helped a whole lot of people, either in the form of grants to organizations from yet another record-setting pumpkin patch in 2022, to the host of children and families provisioned and provided for through the Christmas Families ministry, or through the many people who approached the parish offices looking for financial assistance. Others cooked and served meals in homeless shelters, while some worked on stewardship, planned giving, our endowments, or environmental conservation. We offered insightful forums, retreats, Bible studies, and meetings of the Benedictine Community. We baptized, offered confirmation, were moved by the power and beauty of our choirs and music program in general, and we re-started our three-service Sunday schedule.

We welcomed the Rev. Sarah Spurlock Biggs as our new Assistant Rector, and we bade a fond farewell to our seminarian, the Rev. Janettarose Greene, who was moving on to her first position at nearby St. Mary's in Arlington. Likewise, we welcomed Reggie Hayes, who is serving with us for an intern year before his expected ordination.

Our faithful Vestry prayed, planned, and worked together to God's glory. I give thanks for those who are completing their Vestry service: Kristi Kubista-Hovis, who has given so much as our Senior Warden, particularly in some areas of policy development and implementation; David Attwood, who has given pioneering leadership during his time on Vestry in both Adult Formation and Discipleship and in helping to lead and develop our Social Justice ministry; Mollie Lambert, who has been a key steward and link with our Outreach ministry (and who is now becoming Assistant Treasurer); and Taylor Houck, who has served for an uncompleted one-year term, and is now a candidate for a full three-year term.

Our talented staff have led in their own areas of responsibility, along with helping out in general as need arose. I have already mentioned our new Assistant Rector, Sarah, and I give thanks for the Rev. Susan Parsons, our faithful, cheerful, and enthusiastic Associate Rector, who continues to serve parttime while being officially retired; Aleta Powell, our Parish Administrator, who is always after ways to increase efficiency and reduce costs; Dr. Jane Tavernier, who is both musically gifted and a believer who views music as her ministry; Stuart Dahlinger, our devoted Sexton; Gilma Balcarcel, who has been an additional mother to the children of this parish for decades, along with offering leadership in hospitality; and Sughra Bakhtiari, who finished her time with us as bookkeeper, departing for a new full-time position closer to her home. I include volunteers here who give so much of themselves that I believe they really are also staff: Brooke Roberts, who serves so wonderfully as a volunteer in the office and as our Director of Communications; Tom Hewson, who gives heart and soul in his service as Treasurer, overseeing an operation that entails managing around \$1 million annually; and Agnes Soos, who volunteers faithfully in the office on Wednesdays, and who has especially helped in our efforts to line up those who serve in our liturgies.

And what of the aspects harder to quantify? I think of the welcome so many of you gave regularly to the newcomer or the visitor. I think of you who stepped up to teach Sunday School or sing in the choir, or serve on the newly-revamped Finance Committee, or on the Trustees of the Funds. I am picturing those who came to water new plants during hot, dry periods, or who met with contractors to make sure a task was done. I call to mind the dedicated and comprehensive work of our Buildings and Grounds Committee, as they oversaw an outside study of the condition of all of our facilities. Our thriving Seniors' ministry kept a challenging schedule, while others reached out to care for those who were ill or facing other challenges. Still others planned fellowship events to bring us all together.

This part of Christ's Body continues to recover from the pandemic, and we are now in a fresh, new season, where we need each part of the Body to claim its unique ministry and witness, working together for the good of the whole. That may mean taking up particular tasks in some cases, but in all cases it means praying for our ministry together, showing up faithfully and regularly, inviting others, and giving from all of the resources we have been given. I have seen how God blesses those efforts, and I believe more blessings will follow. I also believe all of these ministries named above, and so many more, contribute to God's hopes for our world.

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Associate Rector's Report

We are in the midst of a 'deep freeze' as I write this; snow is piled up outside, salt encrusts sidewalks, cars and streets, and being outside is just not that appealing. All of this makes now the perfect time to settle down inside and reflect on the past year here at Immanuel.

As with all years at Immanuel, it was busy. Senior Ministry kept a robust schedule of three activities a month – two lunches, and a field trip to somewhere interesting, which included transportation. We had a great year. We heard from wise people, drank wine while sitting outside in the sun at a winery, visited museums, and walked about with bald eagles, beavers, herons, and zoo animals. Also, evensong at the cathedral and an aviary. A full account of Senior Ministry can be found in Karen Besser's report, as it is her energy, creativity and sense of fun that drive the senior ministry. I simply have the honor of encouraging, attending, and praying for this powerful ministry.

Our Pastoral Care committee continued to offer prayer and emotional, social, and spiritual support to our Immanuel families. We visited people in the hospital, in assisted living, and in their homes, often taking Communion to them. We also organized or coordinated rides or meals for people. This is a loving, compassionate, quiet ministry. We pray, we write, we call, we visit, we listen.

The Altar Guild continued its vital and quiet work in 2023. We changed linens, we bought wine and wafers, candles, brass, and oil. We set up for services, washed and ironed linens, changed frontals, bought wine, tasted wine, set up the books on the Altar for readers and clergy and dug about in drawers and closets looking for random items like water pitchers and ashes. We polished brass and silver. We got to church early to set up and stayed late to clean up. This may sound a bit tedious, maybe even complicated, and difficult, but we love our ministry; we love that it can be contemplative, prayerful, companionable, unnoticed, and a joy, all at once. Come join us.

In Summer 2023, I had the honor and pleasure of being a solo clergy for the better part of August, and though it was a bit more work, it was also a delight to have you all to myself. Then, this last fall, Reggie and Sarah joined the team to help ensure that Immanuel continues to flourish.

I preached, celebrated, taught, learned, prayed, worried, washed and ironed linens, listened, blessed, visited and wrote essays. I ate a lot of lunches out and drank a lot of coffee. I zoomed and attended meetings. I told stories. It was a year of blessings and, most especially joy, for me. I am humbled by your love and support.

For me it epitomizes why we are here and for whom we do our activities. Leaving Vestry after three years is bittersweet. I joined three years ago because I felt a calling to serve, and I wanted my family to develop deeper connections across the church. will forever be grateful.

Senior Adult Ministry and Fellowship Report

Our Senior Adult program is designed to provide a regular schedule of activities for parishioners 60 years of age and older that will foster strong bonds of friendship and community whilst we are enriching our faith, enjoying local venues both familiar and new, and challenging us to learn new information and engage with ever-changing technology. We have two luncheons per month, one at Goodwin House-Alexandria and one in the parish hall at Zabriskie, and we have one activity per month, often involving trips off-campus. Our activities are designed to be accessible and no or low-cost, and usually involve eating together!

This year's many activities included a guided tour of the fabulous paintings of 18th C. Udaipur, India, learning about the suffragettes incarcerated in Lorton Prison, meeting a robot and watching a 3D printer in action, encountering birds at the Zoo's new bird house and on the Neabsco Creek boardwalk, learning about (and tasting) the finer points of tea and how to listen to the Rachmaninoff Vespers, and attending Evensong amidst the exquisite stained-glass colors of the Washington National Cathedral. We talked about what makes us resilient, how to be a dementia-friendly community, shared our favorite games and puzzles, and so much more.

104 seniors (or "senior-adjacents") have participated in Senior Adult Ministry and Fellowship events this year, with 80% of people attending multiple events. If you did not attend a Senior event during 2023, consider yourself invited to join us during 2024. Plans include visits to both the newly reopened Smithsonian Air and Space Museum and the National Museum of Women in the Arts, an encounter with digital and experiential art at Artechouse (with grandkids invited!), the Senator John Warner Maritime Heritage Center, and (revisiting an old favorite) the Bladensburg Waterfront Park (hopefully with a pontoon boat ride). And closer to home, an ice cream social with hymn sing, and creating a dried flower window ornament for spring. Our committee has had a busy and productive year. We have completed both "known and unknown" projects. In addition, dedicated parishioners have held several garden and site workdays throughout the year. Tom Kerns serves as chair and other members include Sarah Glass-co, Amy Thomas, John Bednar, Doug Henry, Doug Onley, Brian Rush, and Kevin Kirby. Our Junior Warden, Gerry Anderson, has provided excellent support and is our liaison to the Vestry. We meet the first Monday of every month.

COMPLETED PROJECTS IN 2023

Rectory: Replace HVAC unit and the dishwasher, provide concrete patio, paint interior, add battery backup to sump pump.


- 1. Replace controls on HVAC system.
- 2. Install security cameras.
- 3. Install glides on parish hall chairs.
- 4. Solve presence of mice and yellow jackets.
- 5. Replace lighting in Chapel ceiling.
- 6. Install gifted teak benches in Memorial Garden.
- 7. Continue to work on drawings for kitchen renovation and storage project.
- 8. Analyze appropriate coverage for property insurance.
- 9. Execute 10 year lease with Valley Drive Preschool.
- 10. Help coordinate analysis of buildings with Smart Church Solutions.
- 11. Installed new sump pump at Fairchild Room
- 12. Repaired roof at the steeple.

2024 UPCOMING PROJECTS

The recently completed "Facility Condition Assessment" report provides an excellent roadmap for future maintenance projects and their inherent costs into the future. We have included several projects identified as needing immediate attention to be completed in the coming year.

Per report needing immediate attention:

- 1. Repair drywall cracks in the Narthex and balcony ceiling and repaint surfaces.
- 2. Repair brick landing at the western porch and caulk sidewalk.
- 3. Replace one of three HVAC units.
- 4. Enlarge scupper and downspout at western porch.
- 5. Renovate sexton's closet.



- 7. Complete structural drawings for kitchen renovation.
- 8. Retain arborist for assessment of trees.

We anticipate that the costs of these projects are within the funds allocated in this year's budget plus significant and generous gifts by parishioners for the sprinkler system.

FINAL THOUGHT:

SPIRITUAL RETREATS

On 17 Sunday mornings, interested parishioners gathered in person to learn ministry updates, social justice initiatives, creation care opportunities, Lenten series and theological concepts on the stewardship theme Rooted and Grounded in Love and Community. Average attendance for in-person and YouTube viewing combined was 49 people per Forum Hour, which take place after the 9:00 a.m. Eucharist in the Parish Hall or after 10:30 a.m. Eucharist, in the Welcome Center. Communications Report

he communication function at Immanuel-Church-on-the-Hill is vital to parish life. I am stating the obvious but also want to emphasize that without consistently strong communication channels, we would not be a community united in our intent to worship God and to help those in need.

Calendar year 2023 was the first year I served on the Immanuel vestry. As the steward for Communication, I have learned a great deal about how Immanuel communicates both internally and externally but will say that it has been more a year of education for me rather than one where I have taken part in initiatives to move them forward. Here is to great intentions for 2024!

In my year of observing, I have ascertained that communication happens successfully at Immanuel thanks to the dedicated efforts of the clergy, staff, and that of many parishioners. Following are just some of the examples of how we, as a parish are sharing topics like good news, sad news, deep thoughts, event details, Pumpkin Patch advertisements, service schedules, and very importantly, the Gospel. The list of course goes on and there are so many people/communication leaders to thank that I will certainly (but inadvertently) leave some folks out. With that said, I have compiled a limited table of some of the ways we are getting the good word out. THANK YOU to our communication leaders for all that you do!

Immanuel's periodicals serve both internal and external communications purposes. Faithfully produced every week of the year by **Aleta Powell** was Immanuel's oldest and most basic publication, the "Announcements and Parish Notes" section of the Sunday bulletin, which is not only available in print for churchgoers, but also is posted to Immanuel's website for anyone to see. Our "This Week at Immanuel" newsletter continued to be emailed each and every week to parishioners and other subscribers, previewing Sunday services and Forum Hours, advertising upcoming events, and announcing news of interest to the parish.

Two periodicals have seen changes this year. The spirit-lifting meditation *Simple Gifts*, authored by clergy and lay contributors and overseen by **Dani Kauffman**, moved during the summer of 2022 from a weekly to a monthly publication but continues a robust readership.

A more profound change was made to Immanuel's magazine *Almond Tree*, which will be phased out following its final issue. The reality of time constraints made it impossible to continue publishing a magazine of its size and scope. It is being replaced with the new *Newsletter On-the-Hill*, a more streamlined calendar-driven monthly periodical that still features a Vestry/clergy perspective and a ministry highlight. It is hoped this new monthly periodical can be the reliable, useful, and sustainable publication that Immanuelites have requested.

It is crucial for Immanuel's communications to stay nimble and relevant – and input from the parish is what keeps us on track. Please consider this invitation and encouragement to share any comments, concerns, ideas, or suggestions for improving Immanuel's communications.

Since this report began with a question, here's a final one to conclude: How can Immanuel Communications better serve you?

Worship





In 2023, worship at Immanuel Church-on-the-Hill has continued to evolve as we look for ways to best serve our parishioners and our community. The 8 AM service at Zabriskie is well established, with a dedicated group of parishioners. Likewise, the 10:30 service at Immanuel chapel has been consistently held since returning to in-person worship, with slowly, but steadily, increasing attendance throughout the year. In the fall we experimented with adding a third Sunday service at 9 AM in Zabriskie, followed by Sunday School at 10 AM. A return to a three-service schedule meant shifting schedules for our three priests, our music director and choir, our worship volunteers, and our tech support - however, the experiment was overall well-received and did result in a modest increase in overall Sunday attendance. Immanuel Church-on-the-Hill is blessed with two wonderful sites in which to worship and we will continue to discuss how best to schedule services. Feedback and suggestions are always welcome.

Additionally, we continued to offer a Wednesday service, which was moved from the evening to mid-day toward the end of the year, as well as a Friday evening compline service via Zoom.

Our choir continues to provide amazing music under the direction of Dr. Jane Tavernier. A special thanks to the choir and Dr. Tavernier for providing music at both the 9 and 10:30 services in the fall! Additional choir members are always welcome.

Our audio-visual ministry enables us all to hear all our various speakers and music properly; it is a vital ministry that is quickly forgotten except for when things go wrong, which fortunately is quite rare.

Immanuel chapel is a beautiful worship space, but very acoustically challenging. Thanks to all the work that has gone into enhancing the ability to hear the speakers clearly (insider tip: if you still have trouble hearing the speakers, move over to the far-right side, nearest the pulpit, as the sound tends to be much clearer on that side). Our 10:30 AM Sunday morning service continues to be broadcast via YouTube (subscribe to @ ImmanuelChurchontheHill) with a robust number of views for each service. Additional volunteers to help with this ministry are welcome – it's not nearly as daunting as it may look.

Our flower guild makes beautiful flower arrangements year-round, enhancing the look, and even the smell, of our worship space. In addition to the arrangements in both of our worship spaces on Sunday mornings, they also provide flowers for any additional services throughout the year, such as funerals.

Thanks to all who participate in the various lay ministries. It takes many volunteers to make our services run smoothly and it is very helpful to the clergy to have lay members signed up in advance of a service. Unfortunately, many roles have been unfilled over the past year. We are fortunate to have a full clergy along with seminarians, priests associate, and a postulant intern who have been willing and able to fill in the gaps; however, we really want to have additional parishioners fill more of the roles. We are happy to provide training to anyone interested. The Lay Ministry Signup Genius can be accessed from the home page of our website: www.immanuel-on-the-hill.org. For those who prefer not to use the computer, please talk to me or one of our clergy and we will be happy to sign you up. The various ministries are as follows:

- Acolytes Carry the cross, candles, and the communion elements back and forth to the Altar. Aid the clergy as needed during the service. This role is often covered by children and teens, but adults are welcome as well.
- Altar Guild Responsible for setting the Altar before each service and cleaning up afterwards (following a simple one-page set of instructions). Also responsible for caring for the vestments, communion silver, and Altar linens.
- Chalice bearers Administer the consecrated wine at the Eucharist.
- Intercessors Lead the Prayers of the People.
- Lay readers Read the lessons and lead the psalm.
- Ushers Welcome people as they arrive, hand out bulletins, provide direction for Communion, and generally help out and answer questions as needed.

On a personal note, I'd like to encourage anyone to try out ministries that perhaps you haven't considered before. A few years back, I agreed to join the Altar Guild because Rosi Urbine asked me to – and I couldn't say to no Rosi. I had never even considered that particular ministry, but it has truly been a blessing to me. I find that setting the Altar in a quiet sanctuary (or one filled only with a practicing choir) to be a prayerful way to prepare for the worship service. And feeding the leftover bread to the birds has been an activity that fills me and my daughter with delight each time. Despite my initial concerns, it turns out that there is a simple one page of instructions to follow. And I also found out that everyone is quite understanding and forgiving if you happen to forget to put out a chalice or even break a glass bowl (as I did on my very first week).

In closing, thank you again to all that contribute to worship at Immanuel. I won't attempt to name all of the contributors, but every single one of you is greatly appreciated.

Immanuel used newspaper ads to list the services for Easter, Advent, and Christmas.

Outreach Steward's Report

2023 was another wonderful year for the Outreach ministry at Immanuel. I want to thank all of our parishioners who have used their talents and time to serve others, as faithful stewards of God's grace.

PUMPKIN PATCH

2023 was the 30th year for the annual Patch. Every year, my faith is strengthened by participating with our parish in this wonderful ministry that supports local, national, and international charities. Four 18-wheel semi-trailer trucks delivered a great assortment of pumpkins and gourds including spookies, snowflakes and swans. Donations of baked goods, crafts, soups, and our famous apple crisps contributed to successful sales. I want to give a special thanks to Sandhya Augustine who, for the second year, took the lead organizing the bake goods for the Patch, ensuring that there was plenty of inventory of cookies, cupcakes, brownies, pies etc. to sell as well as providing useful packaging tips to all bakers. I also want to thank our fabulous soup makers; 2023 soup sales were the highest in Patch history.

In 2023, all of us experienced a shift away from the pandemic restrictions and a return to a more daily routine. This resulted in increased competition for the Patch since various groups that were closed the past two years, reopened for pumpkins sales last fall. Our profit from the 2023 Patch is \$80,500. It is less than the past two years but still, a fantastic amount. Disbursement of these funds is overseen by the Outreach Committee coordinated by Jim Snow, Jim Wise, and Julie Bruns. For grants, the Committee reviews all proposals for funding and requires that each has the support and involvement of a parishioner or member of the clergy staff and meets approved guidelines. The 2024 budget also includes amounts for the Clergy's discretionary fund, a reserve for unanticipated requests that are made during the year and overhead costs for the Patch.

CHRISTMAS FAMILIES

Christmas families has evolved into a multi-prolonged program of several activities all serving one purpose: To bring Christ's transformative and comforting presence into the world, letting God's people know that somebody cares through giving toys and science kits and books to learn and grow with and blankets to keep warm. For 40 years, this ministry has provided an invaluable service to the Alexandria community by helping families during the Holidays. Referrals are made by Community and Human Services, the Lazarus Ministry (Episcopal Region IV) and New Hope Housing In 2023, Christmas Families provided gifts to 98 families consisting of 118 parents and 224 children. In addition, 300 books were given to Child and Family Network Centers (CFNC), for every one of the 150 CFNC preschool children. An additional 500 copies of Palabras (Spanish/English dictionary) were also donated to CFNC. The special collection for Christmas Families was \$13,300.

Christmas Families in August

As a parish, we provided backpacks filled with school supplies for 70 children referred by the Alexandria Department for Community and Human Services. Through parishioner's generosity for the special collection, we were able to send three checks for school supplies: \$2,000 to the Micah Project and \$1,000 each to the after-school program of Community Lodgings and to the Department for Community and Human Services

OTHER OUTREACH ACTIVITIES

The Outreach Report would not be complete without mentioning several other activities supporting Immanuel's commitments to those in need particularly in the Alexandria community.

Carpenter's Shelter

The awesome "Immanuel Team" of chefs, servers and cleanup crew continue to provide extraordinary service in support of Carpenter's Shelter. On the second Thursday of each month, these volunteers, led by Connie Kurz and Laura Snow, provide a nutritious and delicious meal to the Carpenter's Shelter's residents. During 2023, the Team served 630 people. And hats off to Connie Kurz who added a child friendly appetizer bowl to the menu to encourage the kids to eat fruits and vegetables (it worked). At right is a picture of Connie Kurz and Martha Manson doing prep work.



Blood Drive

Thanks to the leadership of Katherine Maas, Immanuel sponsored its second blood drive with INOVA Blood Donor Services on November 19th, 2023. The result was an unqualified success, producing more than 25 units of blood. According to the latest statistics, approximately 29,000 units of red blood cells are needed every day in the. I am looking forward to another blood drive in fall 2024.

ALIVE!

In addition to providing financial support, the parish donates food to ALIVE! each January and June. During 2023, Immanuel donated over 1,600 pounds of food, one of the largest food donations made by a member congregation of Alive. Also, with assistance from Scout BSA Troop 131, Immanuel recently participated in ALIVE!'s Furniture Program. Every Saturday, Alive volunteers collect donated furniture and deliver these items to City of Alexandria residents. It is a wonderful program and I encourage people to volunteer.

Meals on Wheels

Immanuel's ministry with Meals on Wheels (MOW) ministry continues to thrive. The mission of MOW is simple: to deliver wholesome meals to seniors and other homebound folks in Alexandria who are otherwise unable to venture out and shop or are resource limited. Immanuel participates on the third Friday of every month. If you are interested in participating in this program, please contact Doug Henry,

Pastoral Care

"For as in one body we have many members, and the members do not all have the same function, so we, though many, are one body in Christ, and individually members one of another. Having gifts that differ according to the grace given to us, let us use them: if prophecy, in proportion to our faith; if service, in our serving; the one who teaches, in his teaching; the one who exhorts, in his exhortation; the one who contributes, in generosity; the one who leads, with zeal; the one who does acts of mercy, with cheerfulness" Romans 12:4-8.

The 2023 Pastoral Care Committee was chaired by the Rev. Susan Parsons, with Julie Bruns serving as Vestry Steward. Committee members included Mary Ann Rehnke, Cynthia Caples, Sarah Glassco, Jessi MacLeod, Sara Fein, Mark Fearer, Susan Kernan, Rosi Urbine and Lisa Frye. This group provided direct personal contact and spiritual/emotional support to individual parishioners experiencing difficulty, illness, and sometimes a beloved's death.

Pastoral Care Committee kept two prayer lists:

- Parishioners who Requested Prayers and also friends and family of parishioners needing prayers to help them through crisis situations.
- Deaths of Parishioners (including friends and family of Parish Members) the Previous Week these loved ones were remembered in daily prayers by clergy and PCC members.

Names from both lists were published in the Sunday Immanuel bulletin so that other members of the parish could remember them in their prayers. As always, anyone wishing to be on the Prayer List confidentially was listed with a pseudonym.

Pastoral Care members took turns contacting those on the Prayer List directly, by phone or personal visit, to assure them the parish was thinking of them, checking on their well-being, acknowledging their difficulties, keeping them in our prayers, and giving those so inclined an opportunity to talk about what was on their minds. PCC members met monthly (via Zoom) to pray for those on the prayer list and to discuss if anyone needed other support or assistance.

Pastoral Care members, licensed by the Diocese to distribute communion to parishioners who are homebound, hospitalized, or otherwise unable to get to church, performed Lay Eucharistic Visits as requested.

Pastoral Care is an often unsung – but incredibly powerful – ministry of lifting up those we love in prayer.

Social Justice Ministry

Immanuel's commitment to social justice is grounded in our Baptismal covenant of "working for justice and peace among all people and respecting the dignity of every human being" and on Jesus's commitment to justice and love for those marginalized by society. The Rector's 2022 letter, the Vestry's vision for the social justice ministry, and other information on the website highlight our focus on racial justice, criminal justice, and engagement in the community.

Parish Engagement/Learning: All parishioners were invited to join with members of the social justice ministry committee to participate in Virginia Interfaith Center for Public Policy's January, 2023 "Day for All People" in Richmond, and the parish was asked to keep all those participating in their prayers. Those who attended were briefed on a wide range of legislative issues and processes focused especially on criminal justice reform; several parishioners were also trained by the Arlington County Jail Chalain to remotely review inmates' Bible study responses.

Criminal Justice Reform: With Vestry encouragement, and relying on the Vestry's 2021 guidelines for social justice advocacy, twelve parishioners participated in Virginia Interfaith Center's dialogue with the Virginia legislature in January, 2023 to advocate for limiting prolonged solitary confinement, something decried by the national church (and many other denominations and the United Nations) as a form of torture. The result was one of the few pieces of bipartisan legislation to emerge from the Assembly. We were joined by members of Alleyne AME Zion church and were the largest northern Virginia faith contingent participating, and will continue this dialogue in 2024. This year also marked the completion of activities under the national church's 2021-2023 Becoming Beloved Community criminal justice seed grant to Immanuel reported on last year; the grant final report is available on the social justice webpage.

Support to prisoners and their families. Several parishioners committed to engage remotely with inmates at Arlington County Jail as they complete in-jail Bible studies. Christmas families offered to provide books to children of inmates as well. Financial support augmented Outreach support to several organizations supporting prisoners and their families, including Offender Aid and Restoration and Friends of Guest House, as well as the Arlington County Jail Chaplain.

Civic Engagement with other parishes: We again provided voter registration opportunities at the Pumpkin Patch, but have concluded that there may be more effective locations in 2024. Our ongoing relationship with Alleyne AME Zion church was challenged by the tragic death of their relatively new Pastor, with whom we had undertaken several activities; we expect this partnership to resume in 2024, possibly focused on voter registration of young people.

Other activities. Immanuel's Vestry committed to be a "Living Wage" congregation, which was not difficult given that our compensation plans were already within the higher (local living expense) guidelines of the Virginia Interfaith Center for Public Policy. You can see our certificate highlighted on Immanuel's website. A summer/fall parish dialogue on violence, gun safety, mental health and loneliness led us to explore in October and November possible approaches to help at-risk youth, exploration that has begun with a small grant to Alexandria Seaport Foundation (a court diversion and skills training program for young offenders and other at-risk youth). After October/November discussions of the social justice aspects of the crisis in Palestine and Israel, we chose to use some of the allocated parish budget for the Social Justice Ministry to support the Diocese of Jerusalem (matched by the national church's United Thank Offering) as it faces the greatest challenges it has faced in decades, including supporting the Diocese's Ahli Hospital, one of Gaza's few still-functioning hospitals.

Funding and Coordination with Outreach: From the beginning in 2020-2021, this ministry of justice has built on Outreach's ministries of mercy and helping people in need. We have expanded, deepened, learned from, and provided additional support to some Outreach partners by focusing on ministries of justice and change to help usher in the more just community and world that God is calling us to. With thanksgiving for Immanuel's continued commitment to social justice and funding of this ministry, as well as support from Outreach and a recently completed national church grant, Immanuel has more than tripled total parish support to criminal justice reform and to prisoners and their families compared to 2019-20. The table below summarizes expenditure from the social justice budget. Fuller details, including funding from all parish sources in support of this ministry, are available in the final financial report to the national church on the 2021-23 seed grant to Immanuel, available on the social justice portion of the website. Because some planned parish activities didn't take place in 2023, a higher percentage than normal of this year's expenditures were grants to other organizations in support of this ministry.

2023 Finance Committee Report

Re-Established Immanuel's Finance Committee in January 2023

After a pause of fifteen months, Immanuel's Finance Committee was as engaged as ever, including financial professionals among committee members. Committee members met four times, including two joint meetings -- one with the Task Force for Immanuel's Strong Financial Future and one with the Board of Trustees.

Background for Re-establishing the Finance Committee

In 2022, with coaching assistance from the Episcopal Church Foundation, Immanuel's Strong Financial Future Task Force began work to identify, research, and prioritize tasks and offer recommendations to ensure Immanuel's strong financial future.

Task force members included Kathryn Jackson Haskin, Danette (Dani) Kauffman, Kristi Kubista-Hovis, and Mollie Lambert. Their detailed research and interviews resulted in a report to the vestry in May 2022 that prioritized necessary action items categorized as strategic, programmatic, and operational. In 2023, the newly established Finance Committee met with task force members to use its report in prioritizing Finance Committee goals for 2023.

Additional Finance Committee Key Accomplishments for 2023

Conducted a Facility Conditions Assessment (FAC) of Immanuel's campus including the church, parish hall, and rectory. This received vestry approval August 15, 2023.

Motivation and Goal

The interest in conducting a Facility Conditions Assessment for Immanuel is directly tied to the effort of the Finance Committee to identify capital and operating expenses and/or reserve funds that will be needed and the timeframe for when to expect that these capital and/or operating funds will be needed over the next 15 years.

Working Group members included: Gerry Anderson, Junior Warden for Buildings and Grounds; Tom Kerns, Immanuel's church architect and member of the Buildings and Grounds Committee; Kerry Kelly Wade and Danette (Dani) Kauffman, co-chairs of the Finance Committee.

The Facility Conditions Assessment was conducted on September 26, 2023, by Nathan Parr of SmartChurch Solutions, a firm that specializes in church facility stewardship. This firm provides facility conditions assessments to churches, dioceses, cathedrals, church conference centers, Christian schools, and universities.

The assessment includes a "first time guest experience," evaluates the facilities and maintenance services needed, benchmarks against relevant national cost standards, identifies deferred maintenance items, and provides future cost estimates in current dollars.

SmartChurch Solutions provided a 62-page report on November 5, 2023, that contained specific information, hundreds of photos, and costs to expect for capital maintenance on the campus. Based on the report, the Buildings and Grounds committee members determined that expected costs are manageable with the exception of replacement chillers that will be needed in approximately eight years.

The cost to Immanuel for this assessment, which was competitively bid, was \$7,500, plus travel expenses for the consultant. SmartChurch Solutions was significantly less expensive than the competing vendor. Five references who were clients of the firm were interviewed before the contract was signed.

SmartChurch Solutions offers cloud-based software solutions called eSPACE, a Life Cycle Calculator, at no cost for the first year, for facility "event" management, work order, and asset management to improve the efficiency of the building and facility team.

The Facility Conditions Assessment report was provided to the vestry and members of the Board of Trustees in separate meetings. Dialogue, discussion, and explanation were essential parts of the report presentations.

Established a Capital Reserve Fund Policy for Immanuel that received final vestry approval on January 9, 2024.

Working Group members included: Gerry Anderson, Junior Warden for Buildings and Grounds; and Finance Committee members Sujatha Augustine, Steve Brown, Danette (Dani) Kauffman, Mollie Lambert, and Kerry Kelly Wade.

Purpose of the Capital Reserve Fund

The Immanuel Capital Reserve Fund (Capital Reserve) allows the Vestry and parishioners to fulfill Immanuel's fiduciary responsibilities to the past, present, and future by funding the church's capital replacement, capital improvement projects, and capital repair and maintenance needs.

Capital Replacement The Capital Reserve will fund the planned replacement of each building's core equipment and systems based on their estimated useful life and replacement cost as set forth in a 15-year Capital Budget Plan, based on the most recent Immanuel Facility Conditions Assessment.

Capital Repair and Capital Maintenance The Capital Reserve will fund major repairs or major overhaul of equipment and/or systems due to unforeseen failure prior to the end of their useful life.

Establishment of the Capital Reserve

The Building and Grounds Committee and the Treasurer will create the long-term Capital Budget Plan (15 years) based on the most recent Facilities Conditions Assessment and Life Cycle Calculator.

The Capital Reserve will be initially funded at an amount sufficient to cover the first five years of the newly created 15-year Capital Budget Plan. The initial sources of the funds to establish the Capital Reserve will include:

- a) The portion of the Immanuel General Fund invested with the Virginia Diocese Trustees of the Funds that is not designated for other Immanuel projects
- b) Any remaining funds from monies raised in the 2018 capital campaign to remediate water intrusion which would continue to be designated solely for water incursion and remediation.

Regular Planned Additions to the Capital Reserve

It is vital to the health and future sustainability of Immanuel that the Vestry makes regular deposits to the Capital Reserve to ensure the Capital Budget Plan can be fully implemented. Each year the Building & Grounds Committee and the Treasurer will draft an annual capital budget as a component of the annual budget for Vestry approval.

In the annual operating budget, the Vestry will include a contribution to the Capital Reserve of at least the estimated cost of yearly capital maintenance calculated in the lifecycle planning tool, plus an estimated rate of inflation. In addition, a portion of at least ten and up to twenty-five percent, subject to Vestry decision, of all undesignated bequests generously gifted to Immanuel will be allocated to the Capital Reserve Fund.

During the first three years of the establishment of the Capital Reserve Fund, if operating income is not sufficient to fully fund the Reserve in conformance with the annual capital budget and 15-year Capital Budget Plan, the Vestry and Immanuel's Trust Fund Board of Trustees may authorize an annual disbursement from the Immanuel Trust Fund (Endowment Fund, Callaway Fund, and Memorial Garden Fund) in accordance with the Immanuel Trust Fund Spending Policy. The goal of the Capital Reserve Policy is to discontinue the use of disbursements from the Immanuel Trust Fund beyond the three-year time period.

This report is submitted with gratitude for all Finance Committee members, the participating Building and Grounds Committee members, and the Vestry and clergy of Immanuel Church-on-the-Hill for their active participation and support that allowed the Facility Conditions Assessment and the Capital Reserve Fund policy to be put in place to help ensure Immanuel's strong financial future.

2023 Treasurer's Report

Thanks to the strong support from our community members, Immanuel remains in strong financial condition. In 2023, operating income exceeded expenses, allowing the church to continue to invest to improve its facilities and grow its reserves to support full staffing levels in 2024. A few of the highpoints are outlined below with details provided in the attached tables.

2023 Operating Income:

Total 2023 operating income reached \$874,140, which exceeded the 2023 budget of \$832,200, and all prior years. This strong showing is largely due to:

- Our growing congregation and our community's strong financial support through pledging that accounts for 80 percent of our operating income.
- Other contributions (loose plate, gifts, music/flowers) added an additional 6 percent (\$53,000).
- Rental income contributed an additional 7.5 percent (\$64,700) by tenants such as the Valley Drive Preschool, other worship communities (Um Ull Quaraa, Dignity, Independent Church of God 7th Day), music programs, and community organizations.
- The remaining income (6.5 percent) primarily comes from Trust income that partially funds capital projects and our reserve investment income.

The operating income does not include several other income sources that fund several Immanuel programs.

- Outreach raises funds separately through the annual pumpkin patch sales, which support our annual contributions to deserving local, national and international organizations. A complete discussion of this program that is managed by the Immanuel Outreach Committee is included elsewhere in this annual report.
- Immanuel also has three Trust Funds that have been funded by bequests and have historically been used to fund major capital projects. While the annual distribution is included in other operating income (above), it accounts for only a portion of the Trusts' total investment income. The Trusts have provided a separate report in this report.
- The final source of non-operating income is special funds created by directed contributions. These special funds include Christmas Families, Christmas Families in August, Tudor Davies-Jim Kellogg Music Fund, Education Fund (from prior CYF BBQ sales) and the Clergy Discretionary Funds. These funds are listed in the attached Consolidated Financial Report.

2023 Operating Expenses:

- 2023 operating expenses totaled \$802,580 which exceeded the 2023 budget of \$790,874. Highlights include:
- Not surprisingly, personnel costs account for 55 percent of these expenses. Personnel expenses were less than the budget by \$21,400, mostly attributable to the timing of when

our Assistant Rector started.

- Administrative costs account for an additional 20 percent (\$158,365) of operating expenses and exceeded the budget by \$9,600. While administrative costs are dominated by the Diocesan Pledge and office costs, the exceedance are linked primarily to new refuse taxes, higher postage rates, and additional office supplies.
- Property expenses account for 13 percent (\$102,200) of the operating costs and were \$7,600 less than the budget. These savings were attributable to lower insurance costs and lower Rectory maintenance costs from capital improvements to the Rectory.
- Program expenses account for the final 13 percent (\$103,000). These costs exceeded the budget by \$5,300, due primarily to an expanded number of services with music and flowers.

2023 Capital Projects:

In addition to operating expenses, the church also spent \$38,530 in capital projects that were partially funded by the Immanuel Trust Funds and from operating funds. These projects include: new Rectory HVAC unit, sump pump for Zabriskie Chapel, preliminary Kitchen renovation design drawings, firewall for Immanuel network, new security cameras, a Rectory patio, and new kitchen dishwasher.

2024 Budget

The budget approved by the Vestry is shown on the attached table. Highlights include:

Total 2023 operating Income Increasing by \$40,000 vs 2023 Budget

- Pledges/Contributions Income—Pledges and contributions account for 86% of our income. Currently, we have received 147 pledges totaling \$656,712. This is more than 96 percent of the current projected income of \$690,000 (vs. 136 pledges, \$641,000 in 2023). In addition to actual pledges, the pledge income also includes contributions from known community members who have elected not to pledge.
- Rental Income—In 2023 we lost 2 long-term rental tenants and added 2 rental tenants. We have also largely lost our fitness tenants and therefore the 2024 budget assumes slightly lower rental income.
- Other Income— This incorporates income from solar REC credits, investment income and interest from operating reserves/investment accounts and income from the trusts. The 2024 other income budget income is much higher due to a higher investment income and more solar REC income and accounts for the bulk of the 2024 budget income increase.

EXPENSES—More than \$47,000 higher vs 2023 Budget

- Staffing-- Staffing costs account for roughly 62 percent of our annual operating expenses and \$54,500 of the draft increase over the 2023 budget. The increases were expected due to the combination of a full-time Assistant Rector (Yeah!!!), projected cost of living increases (3.67%-diocese guideline), and higher benefit costs.
- Administrative Costs—Administrative costs account for 17% of our operating budget and reflects roughly a \$2,800 increase over the 2023 budget. The Diocesan pledge is the largest element in these costs but remained relatively flat (vs 2023) under the current formula. The

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increase is primarily from taxes and fees that offset some assumed savings in contractor and office costs

- Facility Costs—Account for 11% of the operating budget and are \$15,000 less than the 2023 draft budget. These savings are from a combination of some Rectory capital improvements reducing annual O&M costs and continued savings from solar panels.
- Program Costs-- Current draft shows program costs in line with the 2023 budget. The most significant differences are associated with paid singers and flowers from having more services. A portion of these increases was offset by a prison ministry grant ending.

CAPITAL- \$10,500 more than 2023

• Capital projects have historically been funded with income from the Trusts. This year, the Facilities Committee has identified \$63,000 in Capital projects. The current draft includes \$46,000 in projects with the \$5,000 VTS capital contribution that could be covered under the current 5% of the 20 quarter rolling average guideline (\$51,400). The projects for 2024 include: Sexton Closet renovation, replacing an additional HVAC unit, additional design on the kitchen renovation, enlarging the Zabriskie scuppers and downspouts, replacement of Rectory windows, and addition of an outdoor sprinkler system.

BALANCE – Swing from Surplus to Small Deficit

• The current draft shows an operating surplus of \$11,300 and an overall cash flow deficit of around \$11,300. These funds would be from our operating reserves.

I would like to thank Mollie Lambert, who has volunteered to be the Immanuel Assistant Treasurer. This is a great blessing to have such a talented and knowledgeable person joining our finance team. It could not happen a better time, having lost our long-term Bookkeeper Sughra Bakhtiari, who accepted a full time job with benefits near where she lives. She will be missed.

Introduction to Immanuel's Trust Fund and Zabriskie Society

In 2016, the Immanuel Church-on-the-Hill Vestry established the Immanuel Church-on-the-Hill Trust Fund (Trust Fund) Policies and Guidelines to consolidate trust funds created in previous decades by the generosity and bold vision of many parishioners who planned and left legacy gifts to Immanuel. Our parish continues to be blessed by the resources of its Trust Fund.

Immanuel' Trust Fund enables the Parish to fulfill its mission to the greatest extent possible by developing ministries beyond what is possible through Immanuel's annual operating budget. The Trust Fund encourages, receives, and faithfully administers planned gifts as expressed by the donor and in keeping with the Canons of the Episcopal Church, the Diocese of Virginia, and the policies of the Parish.

Parishioners and families can make planned gifts to the Trust Fund that will help ensure a vibrant future for Immanuel's mission and ministry over many years to come. Immanuel's Zabriskie Society recognizes those parishioners who make a decision to leave a legacy gift to Immanuel.

Zabriskie Society members have planned and made gifts of all sizes – both large and small and everything in between. There is no minimum gift amount required to designate a future gift and become a member of Immanuel's Zabriskie Society.

Planned gifts to Immanuel are for anyone who wants a meaningful way to continue to support Immanuel into its future. Immanuel is blessed by all parishioners who prayerfully consider their commitment and support to Immanuel's strong future through a planned gift.

The Immanuel Church-on-the-Hill Trust Fund

Immanuel's Trust Fund consists of three sub-funds each with its separate and defining policies and mission.

- 1. The **Endowment Sub-Fund** is a "True Endowment" which holds funds in perpetuity. The annual spending policy permits distributions limited to 3 to 5 percent of a rolling twenty quarter average fund value for maintenance of the rectory, chapel, and any other real property of the Parish, as well as for Parish ministries outside of the regular budget.
- 2. The **Callaway Memorial Sub-Fund** is a "Quasi Endowment." The annual spending policy permits distributions each year from the corpus and 3 to 5 percent of a rolling twenty quarter average fund value. Expenditure of the corpus will require a two-thirds vote of the Vestry at two consecutive meetings.

Corpus and available annual income used by the Parish, subject to any applicable donor restrictions, may be for general fund use, for its building fund, or for religious institutions in the Diocese of Virginia or the Episcopal Church.

3. The **Memorial Garden Sub-Fund** is a "True Endowment" which holds funds in perpetuity. The annual spending policy permits 3 to 5 percent of a rolling twenty quarter average fund value for the maintenance, enhancement, and development of the existing memorial garden at the Zabriskie Parish.

Board of Trustees and its Role

A nine-member Board of Trustees, appointed by the Vestry for staggered terms of three years, oversees management of the invested funds and monitors distributions to ensure compliance with the Fund purpose, spending rules and distribution policies. The Trust Fund is invested with The Virginia Diocese Trustees of the Funds (TOTF), an entity established to manage investments of the three Virginia dioceses and their member churches and organizations. The TOTF is advised in its management by LCG Associates, a financial management firm located in Atlanta, GA. The Immanuel Board of Trustees meets quarterly to review the Trust Fund's performance and discuss other matters under its purview.

The Board of Trustees has two primary responsibilities in overseeing the management of invested funds:

- 1. The financial management objective for the Trustees is to preserve and enhance the Trust Funds' real, inflation-adjusted purchasing power while also providing a steady and consistent spending stream in support of the respective missions of the Church.
- 2. The Board helps to advance Immanuel's Zabriskie Society, the parish's Planned Giving program. The Board advocates for this comprehensive planned giving program to educate parishioners and encourage gifts, grants, bequests, and other legacy gifts to ensure Immanuel's strong future.

We give thanks for the contributions and insights provided to the Board by Jim Clausen and Chandley McDonald for the past three years. They are tried and true Immanuel Church volunteers for which we are grateful.

2023 Trust Fund Disbursements

The Trustees voted to approve a disbursement of funds from the Trust within a range of 3-5% of the total market value of the Fund based on a rolling average of 20 quarters ending as of September 30, 2023. The total disbursement was \$29,844.00 and was applied on a pro rata basis against all three subfunds. The 2024 disbursement will be voted on by the trustees upon receipt of the Vesry's planned application of those funds in accordance with the Trust's Policies and Guidelines.

Gifts to Immanuel's Trust Fund in 2023

No gifts to the Trust Fund were received in 2023.

Immanuel Trust Fund Activity and Value in 2023

The TOTF Investment Committee Chair reported that all of the TOTF's funds performed well and exceeded their 2023 benchmarks. (Immanuel's Trust Fund is invested in the Balanced Fund). His end of calendar year remarks are paraphrased here. Despite concerns about continued interest rate increases, excessive inflation, and fears of a recession, these concerns did not materialize. Economic growth remained healthy and there were indications that the Fed would cease raising rates and perhaps lower them in 2024. All of this was taken as good news by the markets.

As of December 31, 2022, the Trust Fund balance was \$1,023,485. As of December 31, 2023 the total value of the Immanuel Church-on-the-Hill Trust Fund was \$1,151,712.71, reflecting a growth of 12.5% over the year (net of withdrawals).

In late December 2022, the TOTF suffered the first of several cyberattacks. Losses resulting from these attacks were apportioned across all of the Fund's participants. Our share was \$3,666. In June 2023, the Trustees invited the TOTF leadership to visit the parish and explain what happened and what steps had been taken to prevent their recurrence. Specifically, the cyberattacks succeeded because of a reliance on e-mail to authorize the transfer of funds. Once, a key e-mail was compromised, the diversion of funds was accomplished. As a result, the TOTF established stricter procedures and a portal through which Fund participant representatives would be verified prior to the movement of funds. Other changes such as increasing insurance coverage were also put in place.

The trustees participated in a number of discussions with the Finance Committee and Treasurer regarding the establishment of a Capital Reserve. The trustees agreed in principle that the idea has merit and are awaiting details on how the Reserve would be implemented and maintained. Please see page 38 of the annual report for more details.

Board of Trustees Recommendation

In accordance with The Trust Fund Policies and Procedures, the Vestry provide the Board with the written notice of their planned programs and projects against which the proposed application of an annual withdrawal from the Trust would be applied. Upon receipt, the Board will meet to consider a withdrawal within the 3-5% range allowed.

The Vestry approve without delay the new slate of Trustees, whose service would extend through December 2026.
