MARGARET CARRINGTON STOCKTON

1942 - 2023



Margaret Carrington Stockton, wife of Carlton Alonza Stockton, passed away on the morning of February, 21st at Fairfax County Hospital.

Margaret was born in Danieltown, Virginia on March 16, 1942 to James and Marian Carrington. Margaret spent her early childhood with her parents and brother, Kensey, living near relatives in Danieltown. She started elementary school in 1946 at age 4 and graduated from James Solomon Russell High School in 1959. She enrolled in Saint Paul's College as a business major in 1959 and graduated in 1963. After graduation she worked in an accounting office of a brewery company in

Brooklyn, New York. In 1964 she and Carlton were married in Saint Paul's College Chapel by Father Easley.

Margaret enrolled in New York University and, after receiving her Masters degree in Business Administration, began her teaching career. Her first teaching position was in Long Island City, New York. She held multiple teaching positions in Oakton, Michigan and Fairfax County Virginia at Robinson High School. In 1971 Carlton and Margaret's son Khary was born in Hutsell Hospital in Detroit, Michigan.

They both entered graduate school during the summer of 1976 at Harvard University -- Margaret in the graduate school of education, while Carlton attended the Kennedy School of Government. Khary attended the day care with other children of students from around the world. After completing their graduate studies in 1977, the family settled in northern Virginia.

Margaret was committed to public service and active in her community. She was initiated in Delta Sigma Theta Chapter at St. Paul's College. She was active in the churches she attended: first at Mount Zion Church in Danieltown, followed by Immanuel-Church-on-the-Hill in Alexandria, and

finally, Bruton Parish in Williamsburg, VA. She fulfilled her ministry duties at Bruton Parish through an extensive program for members of the parish.

Her community efforts continued with her sorors of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority in Williamsburg, Virginia. She held many leadership positions with the local chapter and often participated in local events. In addition, she



volunteered for other organizations like Vintage Ladies, and Meals on Wheels. Margaret and Carlton were honorary alumni of the College of William and Mary, where their son, Khary was educated. She was also active with the William and Mary library advisory group.

Margaret is survived by her husband of 58 years, Carlton, their son, Khary, daughter-in-law, Susan, and grandchildren, Jahi and Isa. She is also survived by her brother, Kensey of Richmond, niece Janelle, nephew Arthur, grandniece, Amaya.

Margaret was the ultimate matriarch. She loved to be with family and was an excellent cook. Just ask her grandkids!

The liturgy for the dead is an Easter liturgy. It finds all its meaning in the resurrection. Because Jesus was raised from the dead, we too, shall be raised.

The liturgy, therefore, is characterized by joy, in the certainty that "neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord."

This joy, however, does not make human grief unchristian. The very love we have for each other in Christ brings deep sorrow when we are parted by death. Jesus himself wept at the grave of his friend. So, while we rejoice that one we love has entered into the nearer presence of our Lord, we sorrow in sympathy with those who mourn.

All please stand while the following anthems are said. (Book of Common Prayer, page 491)

Opening Sentences:

I am Resurrection and I am Life, says the Lord. Whoever has faith in me shall have life, even though he die.
And everyone who has life, and has committed himself to me in faith, shall not die for ever.

As for me, I know that my Redeemer lives and that at the last he will stand upon the earth. After my awaking, he will raise me up; and in my body I shall see God. I myself shall see, and my eyes behold him who is my friend and not a stranger.

For none of us has life in himself, and none becomes his own master when he dies. For if we have life, we are alive in the Lord, and if we die, we die in the Lord. So, then, whether we live or die, we are the Lord's possession.

We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus, your Son. For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In him, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

On the night before he died for us, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

We pray you, gracious God, to send your Holy Spirit upon these gifts that they may be the Sacrament of the Body of Christ and his Blood of the new Covenant. Unite us to your Son in his sacrifice, that we may be acceptable through him, being sanctified by the Holy Spirit.

In the fullness of time, put all things in subjection under your Christ, and bring us to that heavenly country where, with the ever-blessed Virgin Mary, blessed Mary Magdalene, blessed Peter, James and John, and all your saints, we may enter the everlasting heritage of your sons and daughters; through Jesus Christ our Lord, the firstborn of all creation, the head of the Church, and the author of our salvation.

By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. *Amen*.

Celebrant: Christ our Passover is sacrificed for us;

People: Therefore let us keep the feast.

Celebrant: The Gifts of God for the People of God.

Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your

hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

If you would only like to receive the consecrated Bread please extend one hand. Crossed hands indicate you would like to receive consecrated Wine as well, either intincted (dipped) by you or by drinking from the chalice. The glass chalice is for intinction and the silver one is for drinking. If you are physically unable to come to the Altar, please let an usher know that you would like to have Communion bought to you.

Post Communion Prayer

After Communion, the Celebrant says

Let us pray.

Celebrant and People

Almighty God, we thank you that in your great love you have fed us with the spiritual food and drink of the Body and Blood of your Son Jesus Christ, and have given us a foretaste of your heavenly banquet. Grant that this Sacrament may be to us a comfort in affliction, and a pledge of our inheritance in that kingdom where there is no death, neither sorrow nor crying, but the fullness of joy with all your saints; through Jesus Christ our Savior. Amen.






